## FOUR IN COURT IN MATTER OF JAIL BREAK

Fredericton Case Taken Up—Many Expected in Capital for Baptist Convention.

Fredericton, N. B., Oct. 13.—James Briggs of Queens county and William Lilly of Marysville, who sawed their way out of the York county jail on Tuesday, appeared in the police court this morning on a charge of jail break. Albert Willson of Chatham was charged with attempting to escape by assisting in the cutting of two window bars. They pleaded guilty. The four were remanded until this afternoon. An influx of delegates to the United Baptist convention of the maritime provinces will begin tonight. Some 200 people are expected. The United Baptist Institute, composed of ministers of the denomination, will hold its sessions on Friday morning, afternoon and night. The convention will open on Saturday morning at 9.30, and will close on Wednesday at noon.  
Rev. Dr. Henry Alfred Porter of Atlanta, Ga., who is to be in charge of the devotional meetings during the convention, arrived here at noon today. While here he will be the guest of relatives. Rev. Dr. Porter is a former resident of Fredericton.

## POLITICS AND THE CITY

The executive of the Liberal party in the city at a recent meeting decided that in view of the attitude of the city council they would not plan to hold a parade here during the visit of Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King. Mayor Schofield said this morning that he had received an application from the Conservative committee for permission to hold a parade tonight before the Premier Meighen meeting in the army, but on his suggestion the plan was abandoned. Commissioner Frink said that he had received an application for the use of tonight's meeting. He had complied with the understanding that the seats were to be available for the Liberal meeting, should they be required. He said that his idea was to keep the attitude of the city council free from any partiality in the present campaign.  
Hon. Arthur Meighen, Hon. Dr. J. B. M. Baxter and Hon. F. B. McCordy arrived in the city today from St. Stephen in business car 100 and sleeping car Chaudier, which were attached to the Boston train. The party went through to Sussex in the private car Chaudier, where they will address a convention of conservatives from Kings and Queens counties. They will return to the city this evening.

## U. N. B. SEEKS NEWS OF ALL SONS AND DAUGHTERS

A Committee Starting Work Getting Information About Former Students and Graduates.

Fredericton, Oct. 16.—A committee appointed at the annual meeting of the associated alumni of the U. N. B. in Fredericton in May, to take steps to obtain information concerning U. N. B. alumni and alumnae, is preparing to take up its work. The intention is to compile a list of all graduates and former students, showing where they reside at present, their occupation and other information which may be of assistance in keeping them in touch with their alma mater and with fellow-graduates. It is possible that the data secured will be used for a year book similar to that published by other universities.

The information desired is the full name, the maiden name in case of marriage of female, present address, course taken at university, date of enrollment and of graduation, period of attendance at university if degree not taken, honors and distinction, degrees received from other universities, war service, public offices held, books or works published, and other data of interest.

The work of this committee is connected with a campaign for the war memorial, which is to take the form of a building. The commercial depression of the present year has interfered with that campaign, but it will be conducted when conditions are more favorable.

## "WAY DOWN EAST" UPHELD BY COURT

Appeal from Decision of the Board of Censors Allowed and Photoplay Can be Shown in New Brunswick—Judge Crockett's Decision.

The management of Imperial Theatre, acting on behalf of the United Artists' Corporation of New York as allied with the firm productions of David Wark Griffith, this morning received official communication from the reporter of the Supreme Court at Fredericton notifying them that the screen version of "Way Down East," passed on to the higher authorities for final censoring, was now available to the exhibitors of New Brunswick without alteration.

This settles a film matter of considerable importance, not only because of the extraordinary character of the picture itself, but because New Brunswick is only one of two censor areas in the world where it was questioned. The other province is Quebec, but late advice indicates removal of the ban in that province also.

Imperial Theatre appealed to the Supreme Court for final judgment, having the concurrence of the Board of Censors in this action, as that body was not even directed in its opinion of certain brief scenes in the thirteen-reel production. Because of the magnitude of the Griffith masterpiece it was felt by all parties that the Supreme Court test should be applied.  
"Way Down East" is a class of picture not as yet attempted in this section of Canada, but has been playing the metropolitan centres for a considerable time at regular stage-play prices. It is credited with being a most extraordinary picturization of the well-known story and play, and consumed more than two years in photographing its scenes in the natural out-of-doors during the round of the four seasons.

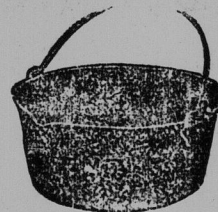

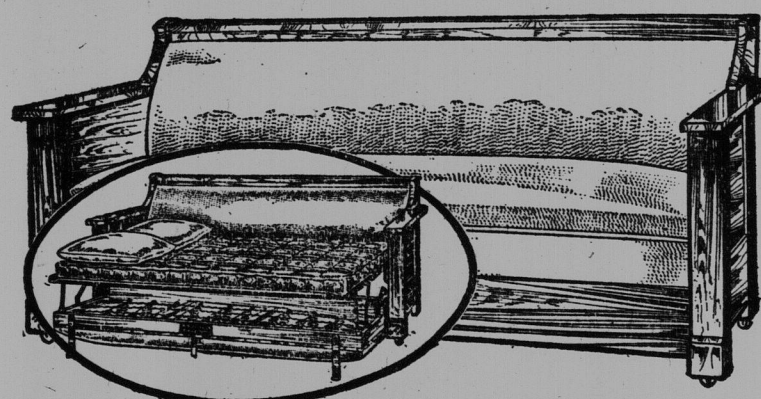
