

## SOME OBJECTIONS TO WAR MONUMENT

The regular meetings of many of the primary chapters of the Imperial Order of the Daughters of the Empire were held yesterday and each chapter was busy planning for future activities.

**Royal Arms.**

The Royal Arms chapter met in the afternoon at the residence of Mrs. F. H. Neve, in Dorchester street, and the regent, Mrs. W. H. Turner, presided. The chapter went on record as being in favor of the erection of a monument to St. John to commemorate those who fell in the war. The regent presented to each member an attractive little box in which to place talent money. The boxes will be opened after the summer holidays. It was decided to increase the contribution made to the salary of a kindergarten teacher in the East St. John hospital and plans were made for holding a tea after Easter.

**Valcartier Chapter.**

Valcartier chapter met at the home of Miss Fleming in Paradise Row with the second vice-regent, Miss Barbara Jack, presiding. In answer to a request it was decided to send a bale of clothing to the Labrador missions and it was also decided to increase the contribution towards the salary of the kindergarten teacher in the East St. John hospital. The chapter did not endorse the plan to erect a soldier's memorial to St. John at the present time, being of the opinion that the educational war memorial of the order and the monument in Penfield were sufficient as memorials until such time as there should be more funds available. Plans were made for the annual Rose ball.

**Windsor Chapter.**

Windsor chapter met at the home of Mrs. A. C. Smith in West St. John and the regent, Miss Eva Newcombe, presided. By a unanimous vote the chapter declared itself as heartily in favor of the erection of a civic monument in memory of the men who fell in the great war. It was decided to increase the contribution towards the salary of a teacher in the East St. John hospital. Routine business was dealt with and satisfactory reports from the dance held recently were received.

**Seven Seas.**

The Seven Seas chapter met at the home of Miss Jean Somerville, in Union street, with the regent, Miss Mildred Wilson, presiding. The chapter voted \$10 to the Grenfell missions in Labrador and also voted to increase the salary of the teacher in the East St. John hospital. Two new members were elected and, when the proposal to erect a monument to the soldiers from St. John was discussed, it was felt that it would be better at the present time to concentrate all efforts on the War Memorial of the order rather than to further anything further of a similar nature. It was decided to hold a tea and sale in the fall. The chapter favored sending a delegate from New Brunswick to the I. O. D. E. convention in Vancouver. Final reports of the recent tea showed \$125 had been netted by that undertaking. The members were busy last night trimming hats for the rummage sale.

**Royal Standard.**

The Royal Standard chapter met at the home of Mrs. H. Fielding Rankins, in King street East, with the regent, Mrs. C. B. Allan, presiding. The chapter heartily endorsed the proposal to erect a monument to the men from St. John who took part in the recent world war. Delegates were appointed to attend the annual meeting of the Provincial chapter in Fredericton this month and arrangements were made for several future activities, including a pantry sale, a bridge, and a rummage sale. The plans for Empire day, suggested by the Municipal chapter, were endorsed. Miss Meiklejohn, supervisor of public health nursing in the province, gave the meeting an insight into the health problems in New Brunswick.

**Lady Roberts.**

A donation of \$10 was voted to the Grenfell Labrador Mission at the regular meeting of Lady Roberts chapter yesterday afternoon at the home of Miss Mary Armstrong, with the regent, Miss Jean Fenton, in the chair. An increase in the subscription to the East St. John kindergarten fund also was voted. It was decided to give two prizes to St. Malachi's school, one to St. Joseph's, and for the LaTouche for the best marks in British history at the coming June examinations. Four members of the chapter who now are in Montreal in training as nurses were made honorary members of the chapter. They are Miss Helen Wilson, Miss Catherine Skelton, Miss Josephine Morrison and Miss Mary Barnes.

**DeMonto Chapter.**

The DeMonto Chapter regular meeting was combined with a sewing meeting and was held at the residence of Mrs. W. E. Foster in Coburg street with the regent, Mrs. S. A. M. Skinner, presiding and a large attendance of members. Mrs. C. M. Bostwick was elected as a new member. Mrs. G. K. McLeod reported that five sewing meetings had been held at the homes of members, as follows: Mrs. W. W. White, Mrs. H. A. Fowler, Mrs. H. Skinner, Mrs. G. K. McLeod and Mrs. Foster. In all 120 garments had been made for the Victorian Order Nurses to use in their work, exclusive of the garments brought in at that meeting and which were to be given to other city charities. It was decided to increase the chapter's subscription towards the salary of a teacher in the East St. John Hospital and to send a money contribution for the Grenfell Mission bales. Mrs. W. H. Lugsdin was appointed to represent the chapter at the annual meeting of the Provincial chapter. Arrangements were made for sending magazines to soldiers' wives in isolated parts of the province.
