

## C. P. R. ANNOUNCES DIRECT SERVICE BETWEEN CHRISTIANIA AND ST. JOHN

Montreal, Sept. 10.—The inauguration of a direct line of steamers between Christiania and Montreal in the summer, and Christiania and West St. John, N. B., in the winter is officially announced by the Canadian Pacific Ocean Services, Limited.

The service will be commenced with the steamer Ravensford from Christiania via Bergen, on October 10, arriving in Montreal on October 20. The Ravensford is a three-decked ship of about 8,000 tons, with 350,000 cubic feet of space, and is owned by a Norwegian-American line.

The service, which is for freight only, will be operated with one steamer a month during the winter time, and it is intended with the opening of the summer season next year to run two steamers a month to Montreal.

## NATIONALIZATION OF THE COAL MINES

Glasgow Trades Union Congress  
Meeting Decides For It by Over-  
whelming Vote

Glasgow, Sept. 10.—By an overwhelming vote the Glasgow Trades Union Congress at today's session passed a resolution favoring the nationalization of the coal mines. The motion, presented by Robert Smillie, the miners' leader, was carried by a vote of 4,475,000 against 7,000.

Mr. Smillie moved that the government be compelled to accept the majority report of the Sankey coal commission. He said he believed the government would refuse the demand for ratification of the recommendations in the report and that within two months the Trades Union Congress would re-assemble to consider the position.

The result of the vote was to throw virtually the entire Congress solidly behind the coal miners' demands for nationalization of their industry. The resolution pledges assistance by the body to the government in the adoption of the report of the coal commission, presented last June, and known as the Sankey report.

This report provides for the state ownership of the mines and for joint control of their operation, in which the miners would have an effective voice. The resolution passed today, calling for acceptance of the report by the government, adds:

"In the event of the government still refusing a special Congress shall be convened to decide what form of action shall be taken to compel the government to accept."

Glasgow, Sept. 10.—Robert Smillie, president of the Miners' Federation, intends to bring about a definite decision as to direct action at the trades union congress here on Thursday. Although yesterday's vote showed a strong current in favor of the strike weapon, the fact that 800,000 votes were not cast is held to prove that a section of the delegates consider a revelation of their real attitude premature at present.

**SEPT. 10. MANY OFFICIALS.**  
A part of the afternoon's session was devoted to a discussion of the preliminary committee's report, which was adopted with the exception of a few paragraphs. Included in the report was a resume submitted by the British delegates as to the labor convention at Atlantic City. The delegates expressed disapproval of the "multitude" of salaried officials, declaring that this condition resulted in a gulf being created between the executives and the rank and file of the unions the latter having "little control over their policy, power and initiative" of their organizations. Further complaint was made as to the power of the chairman of the convention to be had on the part of the union officials, and it was impossible to record other than the official opinions of persons in power.

**NO WORD YET RE  
RUNNING RIGHTS  
ON VALLEY RAILWAY**  
Frederickton, N. B., Sept. 10.—Premier Foster said at noon today that he had yet no announcement to make concerning the conference at Montreal yesterday between C. P. R. and C. N. R. representatives relative to the running rights over the C. P. R. between Westfield and St. John.

**ANARCHY REIGNS IN  
BOSTON WITH 1,375  
POLICEMEN ON STRIKE**

Boston, Mass., Sept. 10.—After a night of disorder in several sections of the city, during which petty looting, street fighting and rioting were common occurrences, the situation caused by the strike here last night of union policemen appeared to be under control of the authorities today. A large force of volunteers, including nearly one hundred Harvard students and former athletes started to patrol beats about the city and to assist the state and metropolitan police detailed here.

The size of the volunteer force was not known. The police department officials pronounced it adequate to protect the city, although Mayor Peters had issued no call for state guard troops, it was understood that arrangements were made last night to mobilize several thousands of them within a few hours if needed.

Boston, Sept. 10.—Just before noon Adjutant General Stevens said that he had learned unofficially that Mayor Peters had issued orders calling the commanders of the state guard units in Boston to assist the civil authorities in preserving order.

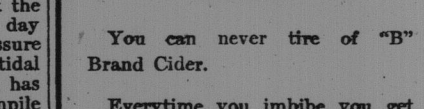
