FOOD COST HIGH ON OCEAN VOYAGES

Atlantic Steamship Companies Pay Big Bills For Supplies of Provisions

In these days, when the high cost of living is so much in the public mind, it is interesting to know what it costs a steamship company to provide the necessities of life to the hordes of passengers who cross and recross the Atlantic, says The New York Sun. The annual statement of the North German Lloyd for 1912, just issued, throws some interesting light on the subject.

Last year the company's bill for provisions alone was \$4,920,000, while during the same period the coal man was paid \$7,876,785 for 1,798,740 tons of coal which were sloshed into the maws of the ships' furnaces during the twelve-month. For these two items alone—provisions and coal—the company paid the enormous sum of \$12,796,785.

That sea sickness does not always interfere with the appetite of ocean travelers is evidenced by the expenditure of almost \$5,000,000 for provisions. The butcher, as usual, reaped the greatest harvest in the matter of provisions, his bill to the North German Lloyd for 1912 being \$1,685,000. This does not include fish and game; for the former the company paid an additional \$288,000, while the bill for the game amounted to \$412,860, a total of \$402,860. These two items, added to the bill for meat proper, brought the amount up to \$2,375,860.

In our household expenditures we are not likely to pay much attention to the cost of preserves, and yet the North German Lloyd spent \$355,760 for these sweets during the year. The bill for fresh vegetables amounted to \$128,110, while for "sundries," including bread, flour, spices, fruits, and the thousand and one articles that are used in the kitchen, the company paid \$1,688,800.

More potatoes were consumed during the year than any other single article, the total amount having been 17,876,878 pounds. Flour ranked next, with 5,318,122 pounds, fresh beef third with 5,769,134 pounds, while the bread was fourth, with 2,853,088 pounds. The passengers consumed 7,096,960 eggs, 4,271,000 oranges and lemons, 707,625 pounds of onions, and 698,802 pounds of salt. They used 465,940 pounds of coffee and 41,729 pounds of tea and 829,618 cans of sterilized milk, to say nothing of 14,918 bottles of fresh cream.

It was necessary to provide 19,119,212 pounds of ice to keep things cool and 12,087 boxes of matches were carried. In the bakery 3,000 pounds of yeast were used, while the quantity of butter—nearly 1,000,000 pounds—was 1,056,037 pounds.

Of wines Rhein and Moselle were most popular, heading the list with 112,211 bottles, as against 35,987 bottles of champagne. Beer, of course, was the favorite beverage, 302,921 bottles having been consumed in addition to 1,720,634 litres of beer in barrels, a litre equal to about one quart.

From these figures some idea may be obtained of what it really costs to provision a great steamship line and of the vast quantity of food consumed.

NEW ARTILLERY CAMP GROUNDS NEAR QUEBEC.

in the parish of Val Carleton on the line

of the Quebec and Lake St. John Rail-

way, 18 miles north of Quebec. The

camp will be ten miles in length and

four miles in width and will be used by

artillery from Kingston (Ont.) to Hal-

ifax. The property has cost the Militia

Department \$250,000.

as a boy. She is seventeen years of age, and her make-up was so good that she fooled the people with whom she was working in a large department store.

She had the voice, the mannerism and the very appearance of a boy, and won a prize of \$20 for singing a boy song at the Majestic Theatre.

Some days ago her appearance aroused the suspicion of the employees in the store where she was working and the information eventually reached the ears of the police.

After being questioned for some time the girl told Inspector Kennedy that she lived at 819 St. Andre street, Montreal, and that she had run away from home and married a man named John Garci-

cielli. She afterwards came to Toronto and thought that the best way to get along was to dress as a man. Her explanation was that she could get along much better and not be annoyed when she walked about the streets. She said she had been accused several times before she adopted male costume, but had not been troubled since.

Daily Hints For the Cook

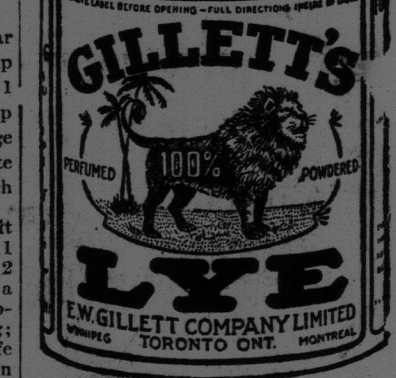
Corrant Sponge Drops

Beat one egg light, add 1 cup of sugar and 2 tablespoons of butter, add 1 cup of milk or cold water, 2 cups flour, 1 teaspoonful of lemon flavoring. Drop in spoonfuls one inch apart on a large baking sheet and bake in a moderate oven. Put a few currants on top of each drop.

Whole Wheat Cream of Tartar Biscuit One cup of entire wheat flour and 1 cup of white flour, 1 teaspoon soda, 2 1-2 teaspoons cream of tartar and a scant half teaspoon of salt sifted together; rub in butter size of small egg; mix very soft and light with a knife with a cup of sweet milk; have oven and pan ready; pat out with hand, cut and bake 15 or 20 minutes in hot oven.

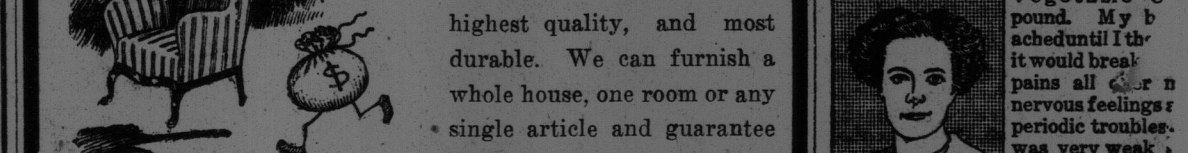
