DRIVEN FROM PORTUGAL; FIND REFUGE IN SPAIN
Five Thousand Members of Religious Orders Have Crossed the Border—Alarm in Alfonso's Country
Madrid, Oct. 17.—It is estimated that 5,000 members of the Portuguese religious orders, expelled from their own country, have taken refuge in Spain where they are now being distributed among the convents and monasteries. It is believed that this will render very difficult the expulsion, from Spanish territory, of those not of Spanish origin.

NO FURTHER WORD FROM WELLMAN'S BALLOON
Boston, Oct. 17.—Walter Wellman's airship America had not communicated with the shore, as far as known up to 8 a.m. today, since sending his last re-ascending message at 12:45 p.m. yesterday. Following the trans-Atlantic steamer Lane, the great dirigible balloon would pass about three or four hundred miles from the New England shore, heading for Sable Island, N. S. It was expected that the wireless telegraph would be in communication with the America today.
