TO RELIEVE CHOKING

MOTHERS who permit their children to crawl over the floor and fill their mouths with everything they can find loose, should have at their finger tips some good remedies for choking. In bad choking, where the patient turns dark in the face, no time is to be lost. Send for the doctor at once. He may have to open the windpipe to save the victim's life. Meanwhile slap the patient on the back, right between the shoulders. Open the mouth and insert a finger as far down as possible to try to grasp the obstruction, and remove it. 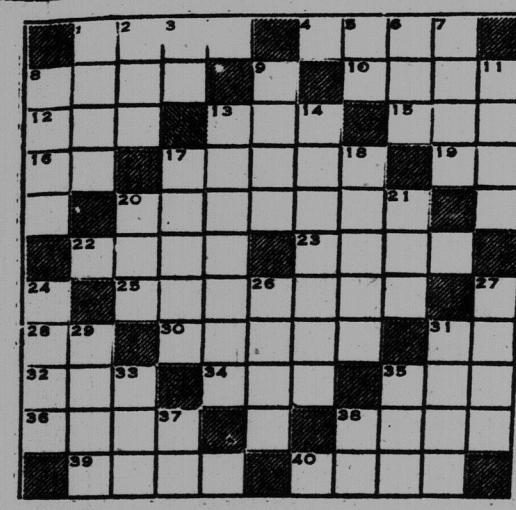

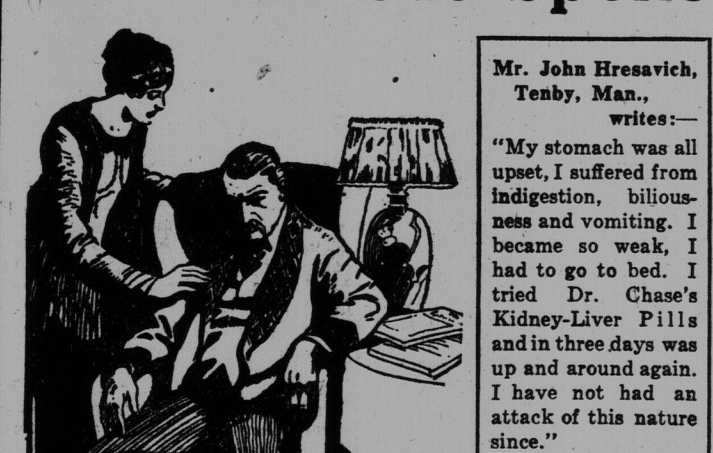

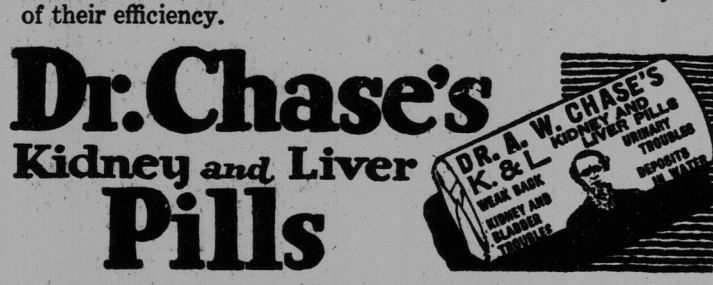

A very attractive evening gown of heavy pink silk crepe de chine is trimmed with black velvet rose petals.

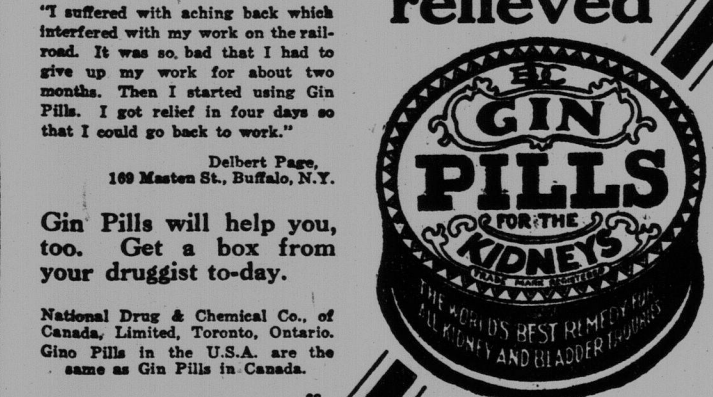
YELLOW SATIN GOWN
