ASK AGREEMENT

The starting of a new industry in Saint John, the proposed fish plant for export to the West Indies, Haiti and Cuba, was foreshadowed in an application to the council this morning for a fixed valuation on the John Sealy property, Strait Shore, for ten years.

Among other matters before the council was a request from Dr. P. D. TO EQUIP PLANT

A communication from McCormack and Zetman asking that a fixed valuation of \$3,000 be placed on the John Sealy property, Strait Shore, for 10 years, was read and Mr. McCormack heard in connection with the request. Mr. McCormack said it was the intention of the firm to establish here an up-to-date plant for the preparing of fish for the southern market. A considerable sum of money would be expended in putting in patent driers and other machinery.

This would be the only plant of its kind in the city and they would be in the export trade only with this product. It was expected that 30 hands would be employed at the start and as the business grew this number would be increased.

The Mayor said export business was what the port was after and any project that would be encouraged, but he felt the city should have some statement as to the amount to be spent on the property improvements.

Commissioner Wigmore moved the matter be taken up at the committee meeting on Monday morning next and this carried.

WITHOUT PERMIT

L. P. D. Taylor, K. C., appeared for the John Sealy Real Estate Company and asked that a woodshed which had been erected in connection with one of their properties in Charlotte street without a permit from the building inspector be allowed to remain until the new building by-law was adopted.

He said this building replaced an old woodshed and the carpenter had neglected to secure the necessary permit. His company were quite willing to comply with the requirements of the new building code, which provided that an unhabited building of wood, if covered with galvanized iron and having a gravel roof, might be erected in No. 1 fire district.

It was decided to let the matter remain in abeyance, provided Mr. Taylor would give an undertaking in writing to cover the walls with iron.

During the discussion the Mayor remarked that while the building had been erected contrary to law, and that Mr. Taylor should have known better, "it was no use being so tied up with red tape that you cannot breathe."

POWER ACCOUNT

The Common Clerk read a request from the New Brunswick Electric Power Commission for payment of the adjustment account of the commission, as provided for in the contract with the city, and also read a communication from the Civic Power Commission in which it was stated that the Civic Commission had not endorsed the bill, as some of the members felt there was due to the city credit for current passing through the city sub-station and sold to the New Brunswick Power Company.

Commissioner Prink moved the matter be referred to the city solicitor for an opinion as to the city's liability. Commissioner Bullock said the commission should be just as anxious to settle with the city for the right of way through city lands as to collect the adjustment account and the latter account had been standing for three years.

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Commissioner Prink asked if an indemnity bond had yet been filed by the contractor for the erection of the new building, Charlotte street, and the common clerk said he had not received it.

Commissioner Harding undertook to see that the bond was filed at once.

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Is Found Guilty In North Shore Case

BATHURST, Aug. 11.—The Gloucester County Circuit Court with Chief Justice Barry presiding resumed this morning and hearing was continued in the case of the King vs. John A. Perkins, charged with a serious statutory offence. The morning was occupied in testimony of E. R. McDonald for the accused and J. L. Ryan for the Crown.

Both spoke at considerable length and developed fully the points arising in an intricate case of considerable importance. Then followed the charge of Chief Justice Barry and the jury retired at 11:30 o'clock and returned to court at 1 o'clock with a verdict of guilty. The prisoner was committed to the custody of the chief justice for sentence.
