Proposed By-Law

Of the Municipal Council of the Township of East Nisouri.

A By-Law to raise by way of loan the sum of Ten Thousand Pounds, payable within twenty years, for the purpose of Graveling, Macadamizing or otherwise improving certain Roads in the Township of East Nisouri.

WHEREAS it is expedient to raise by way of loan the sum of Ten Thousand Pounds, for the purpose of Graveling, Macadamizing, or otherwise improving the Tenth Concession Line from the rear of the Township of East Nisouri, to the middle of the fourth range of Lots, and thence through the fourth, third, second and first lots of the Tenth Concession, southwardly to the Village of Thamesford, and also for the purpose of improving the side line leading from the rear of the Township of East Nisouri to the Village of Thamesford;

AND WHEREAS it is expedient to issue Debentures payable as hereinafter mentioned, for said purposes, and it will require the sum of Eleven Hundred Pounds to be raised annually as a special rate for the payment of said Debentures and the interest thereon, as the said annual sum shall become payable according to this By-Law;

AND WHEREAS the amount of the whole rateable property of the Township of East Nisouri, according to the last year's Assessment Returns of the same was Sixty-Nine Thousand Five Hundred and Fifty-Four Pounds, Eight Shillings, and it will require the annual rate of Four Pence in the Pound on rateable property as a special rate for the payment of the said interest, and for the creation of a sinking fund for the payment of the principal of the said Loan, according to the requirements of the Upper Canada Municipal Corporation Act of 1851.

BE IT THEREFORE ENACTED by the Municipal Council of the Township of East Nisouri:—

FIRST.—That it shall and may be lawful for the Reeve to raise by way of loan from any person or persons, body corporate or politic, who may be willing to advance the sum of money not exceeding in the whole the sum of Ten Thousand Pounds, and to cause the same to be paid into the hands of the Treasurer of the Township.

SECOND.—That it shall be lawful for the Reeve to cause any number of Debentures to be made out for the sum of money so advanced, and to deliver the same to the Treasurer of the Township, who shall be bound to receive the same, and to issue the same in the name of the Township of East Nisouri, and to deliver the same to the said Debenturee or any assignee of his, and to cause the same to be paid into the hands of the Treasurer of the Township.

THIRD.—That a special rate of Four Pence in the Pound, shall be raised, levied and collected, and above and in addition to all other rates and assessments, for the purpose of paying the said sum of Ten Thousand Pounds, with the interest thereon; and the proceeds of such special rate, so to be raised, levied and collected, shall be applied solely to the payment of such Debentures, until the same shall be fully paid and discharged.

FORTH.—That the said sum of Ten Thousand Pounds, when paid into the hands of the Treasurer of the Township, shall be applied for the purposes set forth in the preamble to this By-Law and for no other.

SIXTH.—That this By-Law shall take effect and come into operation on the 12th day of September, 1854.

BY-LAW No. 19.

Authorizing the issuing of Debentures to the amount of \$3,500 for the purpose of paying for the stock held by the Municipal Council of the Village of Ingersoll, in the Derham, Ingersoll, and Dorchester Road Company, and Ingersoll and Thamesford Road Company.

WHEREAS, by-law No. 15, the Reeve of the Municipality of the Village of Ingersoll, was authorized to subscribe in the name of the said Municipality for 400 shares in the capital Stock of the Derham, Ingersoll, and Dorchester Road Company, and by By-Law No. 18, the said Reeve was authorized to subscribe in like manner for 300 shares in the capital Stock of the Ingersoll and Thamesford Road Company.

And whereas, the said shares have been subscribed for by the said Reeve accordingly, and it is necessary that the said Municipality should raise by way of loan, the sum of three thousand five hundred pounds to pay for the said shares, and to issue Debentures for that purpose; and whereas it will require the sum of £230 to be raised annually as a special rate for the payment of the said Debentures and the interest thereon, as the same shall become payable according to the terms of this By-Law.

AND WHEREAS the amount of the whole rateable property of the said Village of Ingersoll for the year 1853, according to the Assessment returns of the same was £25,544 11s.; and it will require an annual rate of one shilling and a penny in the pound on the whole of the rateable property of the said Village of Ingersoll, as a special rate for the payment of the said interest, and for the creation of a sinking fund for the payment of the principal of the said loan, according to the requirements of the Upper Canada Corporation Law Amendment Act of 1851.

BE IT THEREFORE ENACTED, by the Municipal Council of the Village of Ingersoll in Council assembled, First: That it shall and may be lawful for the Reeve of the said Municipality to raise by way of loan from any person or persons, body or bodies, corporate or politic, who may be willing to advance the sum upon the credit of the Debentures hereafter mentioned, a sum of money not exceeding in the whole the sum of £3,500, and to cause the same to be paid into the hands of the Treasurer of the said Municipality for the purpose hereinafter mentioned: Provided, that the said sum of £3,500, and that the said Debentures shall be issued under the Common Seal of the said Municipality, and signed by the Reeve and Treasurer, and made payable at the office of the Treasurer, twenty years from the time of the passing of this By-Law.

THIRD.—That the said Debentures shall bear interest at and after the rate of six per cent per annum from the date thereof, which interest shall be payable on the ninth day of April and ninth day of October in each year, at the office of the Treasurer as aforesaid.

FOURTH.—That for the purpose of forming a Sinking Fund for paying the said Debentures, and the interest thereon, thereon, a special rate of one shilling and a penny (1s. 1d.) in the pound, on the yearly value shall be raised, levied and collected in each year upon all rateable property in the said Municipality, during the continuance of the said Debentures or any of them over and above and in addition to all other rates and assessments.

FIFTH.—That this By-Law shall take effect and come into operation upon the ninth day of October, 1854.
