TORONTO WOMAN HANGED HERSELF

Deliberate Suicide of Mrs. Mary Jane McBride

Toronto, Aug. 3.—Mrs. Mary Jane McBride, aged about forty-five years, deliberately hanged herself Saturday morning in her residence, 256 Welland Avenue. The circumstances discovered by her lifeless body were made by her young daughter about a quarter past nine o'clock. Deceased had not been seen for an hour previously, and it is supposed that she committed suicide immediately after breakfast. It was some time before the distressed daughter recovered her composure enough to find the body. Eventually, the police of No. 4 Division were notified and Sergeant Miller arrived about ten o'clock and cut the cord. Death occurred leaving a husband and three daughters. Some time ago her only son died. She felt the loss very keenly, and it is supposed that brooding over her demise induced melancholia. Coroner Greg, after investigating the circumstances, decided that an inquest was unnecessary.
