TORONTO WOMAN HANGED HERSELF

Deliberate Suicide of Mrs. Mary Jane McBride

Toronto, Aug. 3.—Mrs. Mary Jane McBride, aged about forty-five years, deliberately hanged herself Saturday morning in the washroom in the rear of her residence, 348 Wellesley street. The gruesome discovery of her lifeless body was made by her young daughter about a quarter past nine o'clock. Deceased had not been seen for an hour previously, and it is supposed that she committed the deed immediately after breakfast. It was some time before the distracted daughter recovered her composure after finding the body. Eventually, the police of No. 4 division were notified and Sergeant Miller arrived about ten o'clock and cut the corpse down. Deceased leaves a husband and three daughters. Some time ago her only son died. She felt the loss very keenly, and it is supposed that brooding over his demise induced melancholia. Coroner Irwin, after investigating the circumstances, decided that an inquest was unnecessary.

JULY'S WEATHER RECORD

WAS WARMER AND MORE WET THAN THE AVERAGE FOR YEARS PAST.

July, like the preceding months of 1903, kept up the year's weather record so far as being warmer and wetter than the average of 64 years past. The mean temperature of the month was 1.27 degrees above the average, and 0.83 degrees warmer than July of last year. The lowest temperature was recorded on July 19th when the mercury went down to 69.9. The top point in heat was reached on the 18th, when it stood at 81.5. That was half a degree warmer than the hottest month of July of 1902. The rainfall totaled 4.55 inches, which, like July of last year, was just 1.41 inches above the average. Rain fell on 12 days and thunder rolled on 9 days. The amount of registered sunshine was 277 hours, 4 more than the average and 32 more than July of last year.

HE IS WANTED BY THE POLICE

Henry Godley Said to Have Skipped With a Scarborough Farmer's Sovereigns.

Toronto, Aug. 3.—W. W. Bell, a farmer of Kennedy road, near Scarborough Junction, and one of his hired men, John Cull and Ben Donaldson, are anxiously seeking some trace of Henry Godley. The cause of their anxiety is his surreptitious departure last night with over \$80 in sovereigns and Canadian money belonging to them. Godley has been in the employ of Mr. Bell for about three weeks, and for the last couple of days has been working with Cull and Donaldson, two Scotch men, building a hay stack. He is an Englishman and claims to have come here from Montreal.

Yesterday afternoon he was missed and for two or three hours a search was not noticed, his fellow-workmen thinking that he had gone down to the post office. After three or four hours however, his non-appearance aroused Mr. Bell's suspicions, and a search made which revealed the fact that he had abstracted eight sovereigns from Cull's coat pocket, and four of the same coins from Donaldson. Further investigation showed that he had also gone to a neighboring farm and requested one of the hired men there to let him have two \$10 bills, for four fives. When he got the two tens, he made for the house, saying that he would bring the fives back, but he failed to return.

He had also received his wages, amounting to \$20, from Mr. Bell that afternoon, stating that he wanted it to bring his wife from Montreal.

It is the opinion of County Constable Burns, to whom the case was first reported, that Godley is in the city. He was found to have taken a Scarborough car last night enroute, as far as the Vaughan, where he boarded a King car about 8:30.

The detective department have received the particulars of the case, and are making a search for him. His description is as follows: 5 feet 7 inches tall, clean-shaven, weighs about 140 pounds and is dressed in a dark suit with plaid cap.

ROOM FOR MILLIONS.

The New Railway Will Open up Vast Areas.

Senator Frost's View of the Benefits Which Will Result From the Government's Policy.

At Winnipeg, last week, in an interview Senator Frost spoke strongly in favor of the railway project of the Dominion Government, and continued, "The Government road running from Winnipeg to Montreal will be open for the west to run their business over, and we mean to keep the charges on such a line as low as the country. East of Port Arthur the Government survey party has reported some very fine lands that could easily be opened, and I am sure the Government would be very anxious to open them up. I firmly believe that there is room for the settlement of a million people there. This is the Government's policy to open up the country, because they feel that to open up a close and firm relationship between the east and west we must have more people and more business lying between. If they can accomplish this with the new Government road from Winnipeg to the east coast, with the Intercolonial Railway to coast again, deal will be done not only for the west, but for the entire western Canada. It has always been a long road from Port Arthur eastward that has caused so much trouble in transportation. The 'lumber' is all right, that will take care of itself."
