



#### SUGAR AGAIN ADVANCES.

Sugar has taken another jump, both  
in the New York and London mar-  
kets. Advice from New York today  
says that the price for spot sugar today  
is five cents, which means an advance  
of one-eighth of a cent. Advice from  
London are to the effect that raw beet  
sugar is quoted there at fourteen shil-  
lings sevenpence halfpenny.

### WARNING TO TEAMSTERS

Must Be Careful and Not Over Load  
Their Sleds or They Will  
be Fined.

The S. P. C. A. had two cases in the  
police court this morning. Chas. W.  
Hughes, teamster for A. C. Smith &  
Co., and Chas. W. Whalen, teamster  
for the St. John Milling Co., were  
charged with overloading their teams  
and straining their horses on the east  
side ferry floats. J. King Kelly con-  
ducted the case for the society, and  
called S. M. Wetmore.

Mr. Wetmore said that Whalen had  
a load of about 5,000 lbs on his sled and  
his team had great difficulty in hauling  
it over the floats. It was about an hour  
from water and there was a heavy  
up hill haul.

A little later Hughes came along with  
a load which his team could not haul  
up the hill without difficulty.

Mr. Whalen said that he did not have  
what he considered a heavy load for  
his team. The floats were in bad con-  
dition and his team slipped.

Mr. Hughes said he had a team which  
weighs 3,100 lbs. and his load was a lit-  
tle over two tons. The floats were in  
bad condition and none of the snow  
that is being dumped into the harbor  
should be put on the floats.

Mr. Glasgow said he saw the teams  
and thought the teams were too heav-  
ily loaded for the condition of the  
floats.

Magistrate Ritchie said that team-  
sters should take the condition of the  
floats into consideration when they are  
loading and not overload. He would  
allow the minimum fine of \$5 to stand  
against them and all teamsters should  
take warning and not get into court  
again for the fine would not be so light  
the next time.

are either filled in or have never been  
dug out. The consequence is a flood of  
water during the time the sun is shin-  
ing and a dangerous glare when the  
air is sharp and frosty. This morning  
people proceeding to the city had to  
take the middle of the street and at  
noon the wet condition forced them  
to do the same thing at various points.  
Aside from the inconvenience and dan-  
ger of the thing there is the flooding of  
properties to be considered.

singing.


#### TODAY'S FUNERALS.
