VICE FLANNING ITS WINGS IN SIGHT OF POLICE

Ald. Bullock Says the Sheffield Street Dens of Shame are a Disgrace to the City, and Should all be Raided and Wiped Out—Safety Board Declined to Hold an Investigation Into Officer Marshall's Conduct Complained of by Abner Secord—Refused St. George's Request for Fire Engine.

On motion of Ald. Bullock, the safety board last night, decided that its chairman should call to the attention of the Chief of Police the conditions on Sheffield street and ask that they be removed. The board also decided not to hold an investigation into the conduct of Officer Marshall. The bill for the glazing in the repairs on the exhibition building which was objected to by Ald. Rowan, was last night ordered to be paid.

The following were present at the meeting, Ald. Vanwart presiding: Ald. Bullock, Lantulum, Christie, Rowan, Foul, Bullock, Pickett, and Tilley, Chief Clerk and Director Wisely.

Director Wisely reported that Market street, north and south, has been closed for twenty-four hours according to the order of the board.

The St. John Real Estate Co., Ltd., ask for a further term of fourteen years of the lease of the buildings on Lot 87, King street, west end. The last lease ended May, 1900. The lease was granted at the same annual rent of \$15.

An application was made on behalf of Mrs. Ellen Kane, widow of the late Daniel Kane, asking for a renewal of the lease of Lot 30, Guy ward, which expired May, 1905. Granted at the rate of \$12.25 a year.

A communication from W. A. Cunningham asking for a renewal of the lease of 916, Guy ward, which had expired on the 1st of May, 1900, was granted at the same rate of \$12 a year.

The committee appointed to look over the lands he surveyed and lots laid out. That with reference to the Stems house, that the committee recommend that tenders for leasing same be advertised, (3) and as to the Murphy lots in Fairville on the Spur Cove road that appraisers be appointed to value the lands and considered that it was the duty of the committee to value the lands under the terms of the lease and proper notice given to lease party in possession thereof. (4) That a lease of a lot on Albert street be granted to B. J. Grant at \$25.00 a year. Report accepted.

Ald. Bullock said that the city has far too much real property. He said that the price was excessive and said that the contractor should not be able to make his profit on the extras just because his tender for the work was too low.

A communication from James R. Warner & Co. stated that their property was a quarter of a mile from the nearest fire alarm box and asked for a box nearer at hand.

The matter was left to the chief and director to report.

Director Wisely read the bill of James Huey for the glazing in the exhibition.

Ald. Rowan thought it should be paid.

Ald. Rowan repeated his statement that the price was excessive and said that the contractor should not be able to make his profit on the extras just because his tender for the work was too low.

Ald. Lantulum said that it was a small matter and favored paying the bill. Ald. Tilley agreed with it. It was decided to pay the bill.

Director Wisely said that eighteen new winter coats were needed for the police and repairs to fifteen others.

On motion of Ald. Christie, tenders were asked for the coat.

Chairman Vanwart said the new public lavatory in the Market building would be taken over from the contractor on Wednesday.

The committee appointed to recommend on what disposition should be made of the spare rooms in the Market Building made their report. It was decided to give the Orange Lodge one of the large rooms and a smaller room at \$25 a year, and two other rooms to the Pharmaceutical Society at \$75 a year. The lease was for five years. The report was accepted.

Chief Korr reported that the fire committee of St. George wished to procure one of the old hand engines from the city. The chief said that there is one in Fairville and another at Sand Point, Carleton. Both were in good order and had proved a great assistance at a number of fires.

The chief, continuing, said that although he had informed them that he nor the director had no power to dispose of the engine, he had today received an offer of \$150 for them. The chief thought the engines should be kept as a matter of sentiment and of former times. He hoped and trusted that the city would not part with them, and called the attention of the board to the fact that the Natural History Society would gladly take charge of one of them.

SERVANT PERSONATES

PRINCE HIS MASTER

Pretends He's Maharaja of Jodhpur, and Has Jolly Good Time.

BOMBAY, Sept. 23.—A man who, for a time, successfully passed himself off as Maharaja of Jodhpur—one of the picturesque Indian princes—has caused some heartburning in the State of Baroda.

The real Maharaja's "dressing boy" dressed himself up as his master, and even copied on his own arms and neck certain marks which the Maharaja bears. He then went by train to Baroda, where he drove to the bungalow of the Dewan of Baroda, announcing himself as the Maharaja of Jodhpur.

The Dewan received him with great honor, and drove him in a state coach, with escort, to the guest house, which was prepared for him. At the palace the "Maharaja" explained to the companion of the heir-apparent that he had quarreled with his state officials and had left his state in a hurry.

The assistant political agent in Baroda was suspicious, and told the officials about the marks on the real Maharaja's neck and arms. When they found that the imaginary Maharaja bore those marks they were convinced he was the genuine Maharaja, and for a time the "dressing boy" was royally entertained.

He unobtrusively said that he was anxious to meet the Maharaja of Gwalior, who happened to be in Bombay, within easy distance. His entertainers telegraphed to Bombay, and took palatial rooms for the visitor, who went there next day. But as soon as the Mah-
