Chief McLeod of Sussex has just received word from police authorities at Hull, England, conveying the information that a New Brunswick lad, John Stanley Corbett of Lower Millstream, Kings county, is in serious trouble at that place.

The Stipendiary took it that the Home Secretary, on his own authority tried to find out where the prisoner belonged to, and expelled him.

Chief Constable's Letter. Hull, 23rd June, 1909. Dear Sir: John Stanley Corbett.

The above named, who is 21 years of age, is now in custody at H. M. Prison, Hull, for contravention of the Aliens Act.

I will thank you to cause inquiries to be made and if it is possible to forward a certificate of his birth and all information you can give respecting him.
