SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

By William T. Ellis.

The International Sunday School Lesson for June 29 is a Quarterly Review.

Sailing the Red Sea, as I am while I write, with the savagely mountainous of the Sinai Peninsula at my left hand, it is congenial to pass in review the recent Sunday School Lessons. All of them represent man's quest after God, and God's downrout to man. They stand for the spiritual dimension of the human soul. They are up-to-date as the latest science, and older than the journey of Abraham down into Egypt. At the moment, I am in the region which troubled souls—Moses, Elijah, possibly Paul, and countless anchorites—have resorted to get away from the world, and to the Eldest, the oldest, the most ancient of all, the quest after God himself.

Back of all our day's upheavals and unrest and turbulence, back of the frantic search for new social and political programmes, lies the same old, old quest for the peace of God. We want a condition that is deeper than can be touched by better wages, better housing, better education, and better political privileges. Our desires are many; our needs are one—a closer walk with God.

Travelers' work is likely to be disjointed and scrappy; this article, begun on the Red Sea, is being continued as I sit on the burning sands of the desert crossed by the weary feet of the Children of Israel. Back of me lies the Sinai Range; directly in front, is the palm-fringed quarantine station of Tor, while across the water rise the blue mountains of Africa. Both views embody the point I was treating when I laid down my pen aboard ship; the supreme quest after God himself.

Sinai stands for that truth: There Jehovah drew near to a Chosen People. The clouds were more than a pilgrimage to a land; it was a search after the One God. In the hearts of the noblest of the leaders of the Israelites burned the passion to know God and to do his will. Their zeal was rewarded by the Ten Commandments, which are still the timeliest of all contributions to the betterment of relations between nations and between individuals. Sinai is the mountain of Israel, the mountain of God, and the mountain of the law. I turn and look at the many low buildings of the Tor quarantine station, gazing in the noon sun; and they, too, embody the quest after God. For this largest quarantine station in the world is maintained by the British Government for the protection of pilgrims returning from Mecca to Jeddah. In normal times there are twenty thousand pilgrims every year at Mecca. They come from every quarter of the habitable globe. All are more or less definitely striving to make their peace with God. There is the old, old quest. They seek after the Father above; they hunger, they pray, they

Who shall say that the God who spoke at Sinai does not also speak to devout seekers at the neighboring mountains of Mecca?

Back to the Book.

For three months, the thirty million Sunday school members of the world have been studying fundamental religious topics from the Bible. They too have been followers of the quest. Many have personally found God in this time. He has become to them a living, bright reality. Whoever goes with open mind and seeking heart to this Book of Books is sure to meet God there.

This, then, is the central thought of the day's lesson. God's way is shown by God's word. In the back of my Bible I find a clipping reporting an address of President Wilson, delivered at Denver in 1911, which is most pertinent to this review than anything I could write. Nobody dreamed, back in 1911, that in less than ten years the speaker would be the world's outstanding figure; and that his ideals would be reshaping the entire social order.

What Makes America Great.

We do not judge progress by material standards. America is not ahead of the other nations of the world because she is rich. Nothing makes America great except her thoughts, except her ideals, except her acceptance of those standards of judgment which are written largely upon these pages of revelation. America has all along claimed the distinction of setting this example to the civilized world—that men were to think of one another, that governments were to be set up for the service of the people, that men were to be judged by these moral standards which pay no regard to rank or birth or conditions but which assess every individual according to his single and individual value. This is the meaning of this chapter of the human soul. This is the standard by which men and nations have more and more come to be judged.

That is the reason that the Bible has stood at the back of progress. That is the reason that reform has come not from the top but from the bottom.
