### The Transcript

#### NEWBURY

The poles for hydro have arrived from Chatham and it is expected the work will be commenced soon. The Merchants Bank, post office and W. H. Parnall's store have already been wired.

Miss Bertha Johnston, school nurse at Woodstock, has been appointed by the Government a demonstrator in connection with school nursing, with headquarters in Toronto. Miss Johnston is a daughter of the late Rev. Wm. Johnston, a former rector of this parish.

The box social held in the town hall on Friday evening under the auspices of Knox church Y. P. S. was a splendid success. Reeve Holman auctioned the boxes and good prices were the rule. All enjoyed the pleasant evening. Proceeds netted nearly \$50.

Miss Annie E. Connolly of Detroit spent the week-end at her home here. A. R. Winship, who recently sold his farm east of the village to Wm. Martin, has bought Mrs. Robert Burr. Callan's place and will move in soon.

Dr. McNally, the medical health officer of the district, spoke to the Women's Institute here on Wednesday afternoon. His subject was "Public Health and Welfare." It was an address not only highly interesting but also educational and practical. On account of the almost impassable condition of the roads the audience was small, but those who were fortunate enough to hear it will not soon forget, and regret was expressed by all that the community at large were not present to benefit by the information given in such a clear, concise and comprehensive manner. He first dealt with communicable diseases such as diphtheria, scarlet fever, measles, smallpox, etc. He emphasized the care that should be taken to keep the infected person isolated, also the absolute necessity of vaccination. He spoke on the care that should be taken of milk. The composition of milk is such that organisms develop

and grow very rapidly, therefore scrupulous care should be taken to keep it free from contamination. Then the water which is taken into the system was considered. No matter how deep your well may be, whether in the rock or drilled or ordinary dug wells, they may become unfit for use from surface contamination. The well should have a tight cement covering, also a wall of cement four feet deep, the outer edge of which should gradually slant outward until a thickness of one and one-half feet was reached. Thus nothing could possibly enter from the surface. He spoke of his visits to many schools, the unsanitary condition of many of them being unbelievable. The parents of children should see that the school in which their children live so many hours of the day was just as clean and well looked after in every way as the home. The children should be so well nourished that they could resist and throw off the germs which enter the system. He spoke of the prevalence of tubercular affections, which creeps in and takes possession almost unawares and yet it is a disease very easily overcome if care is taken in time. Give the patient plenty of sunshine, nourishing food and rest. This work of public welfare was not meeting with perfect success—the workers were too few and many had not the time to spend on it. He appealed to the women to rise to the occasion and demand reforms so that we should grow into a strong and sturdy race instead of a nation many of which are unfit physically. It is a matter of vital importance to mankind, and when people at large waken to their responsibility much will be done which is not even thought of at the present time. Elias Roycraft, reeve of Moss, acted as chairman.

At a meeting held in Knox church basement Monday evening to organize for the coming prohibition vote, the following officers were elected:—President, J. G. Bayne; vice-president, Dr. J. P. McNally; secretary, A. Holman; treasurer, W. H. Parnall. The names of Mrs. S. Fennell, Mrs. Wm. Bayne, Mrs. D. Stalker, Mrs. Wm. Armstrong, Mrs. A. Hoinan and Mrs. McNally were added to those to form the executive committee, and a vigorous campaign will be carried on until the vote is taken.

### JUNIOR AGRICULTURE

Boys' and Girls' Live Stock Club Work.

Some Specialize In Calves, Sheep or Pigs, Others Generalize—Banks Accept Notes of Juniors In Rural Bank Building Way.

THE Boys' and Girls' movement bids fair to rival school fair work as the most popular feature of agricultural extension work. Perhaps this is due to the fact that boys and girls literally love animal pets—things that are alive and respond to care and kind treatment. Moreover, because they can call the calf, pig, or sheep their very own, and because some day they hope to sell their animal at a profit and spend the money as they wish, it sustains and animates their interest.

Wherever these live stock clubs have been organized the representatives have the active support and co-operation of the live stock men in the community. This augurs well for the future of Ontario's junior farmers. The boys are commencing early in life to get into the pure-bred live stock business and it is confidently hoped that they will receive every encouragement from their parents and others.

The first live stock club for boys and girls came into being in the early months of 1919. Counting those which were formed previous to the period covered by this report, and those that were organized in 1919, there are 6 calf clubs, 10 pig clubs, 2 sheep clubs and 2 live stock clubs or a total of 20 boys' and girls' live stock clubs with a membership of 450. This is a small beginning, but a number are now in the process of formation and the work will soon spread to every county in the province.

In the purchasing of animals, arrangements are usually made with the local banks to advance the necessary funds on the security of a note from the boy or girl for a definite period at a fixed rate of interest. These notes must be endorsed to the satisfaction of the bank by their parents or guardians. As a rule nothing but pure-bred animals are purchased and these are registered in the name of the boy or girl owner. As a protection, the animals are insured until such time as the notes are paid at the bank.

Both Beef and Dairy Calf Clubs have been organized. The Dufferin County Shorthorn Calf Club has regulations similar to those of other calf clubs formed in the province but there was no special day set apart for distribution of the stock.

In other Shorthorn Calf Clubs organized, heifers from 8-15 months have been distributed to the members. The initial cost in this case was not so great, yet a greater length of time will elapse before any returns are secured.

In some of the Shorthorn and Holstein calf clubs, auction sales were held in order that the members might secure money to pay off their notes. The members had the privilege of bidding in their own animals if they wished. An auction sale for club work has its advantages and disadvantages. If the animals turn out satisfactorily, they should be kept in the members' hands. It defeats the very object for which it was organized, and hence these now being formed are not considering the question of auction sales at all. There is a point in favor of auction sales, and that is that it gives the club a great deal of publicity.

In the Halton County Calf Club, the 27 heifers distributed in February were sold at auction on August 20. A fair was held previous to the sale at which special prices were awarded.

The Peel County Calf Club held a show and sale just one year after the first heifers were distributed to the members, when \$55 was offered in prize money by public-spirited persons.

All members in the Peel Dairy Calf Club had to submit records of feed and milk together with a financial statement showing the profit on their enterprise.

There has been only one sheep club formed during the past year and that was the Albion Sheep Club in the County of Peel.

In the previous sheep club formed in Peel a year ago, two Oxford Down ewes in lamb were distributed to each member. Unfortunately some of the ewes proved not to be in lamb and others lambed unexpectedly in the middle of winter. This proved a hardship to some of the club members though the breeders from whom the ewes had been bought very kindly exchanged those without lambs for two shearing ewes each with a ewe lamb. The 14 members each with 2 sheep had 28 lambs and after the transfers had been made the average was just over 1 lamb per ewe.

In an endeavor to avoid the early lamb misfortune of last season, the representative from Peel organized a breeding flock in connection with the Albion Club. The shearings were shipped in and stocked with a good pure-bred ram on Nov. 12 which resulted in lambs being born at a time when the weather was more favorable.

There are two live stock clubs formed in the province, one in Waterloo County and the other in Brant County. They are confined to pure-bred animals, but they differ from the calf, pigs, or sheep clubs already mentioned in that all classes of animals are included.—R. S. Duncan, Director Agricultural Representatives.

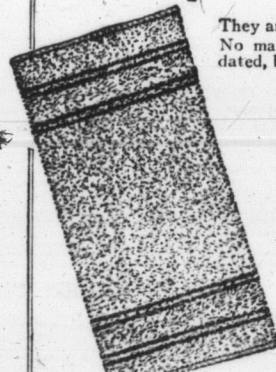
