PIPE BAND BACK FROM NEW YORK RECRUITING TOUR

Large Number of Citizens Were on Hand to Greet the Band, and See New Colors.

WHICH WERE PRESENTED BY MR. AND MRS. NIXON

Active Recruiting for 236th Not Allowed While Party Was in United States.

The Klittes' Pipe Band returned to Fredericton today from their visit to New York after an absence of ten days. The party arriving here numbered 37 and included a new pipe and three other recruits. Six members of the band, including another new piper, remained in Boston for a few days on leave and will arrive here next Monday at noon, until which time all the members of the pipe band have been granted leave for their final visit to their homes.

Capt. J. D. Black and Lieut. H. A. Seely were in charge of the party arriving here today and large numbers of citizens turned out to greet the band and see the new colors. Sgt. O. Burt carried the beautiful Union Jack which was presented to the Battalion by Mr. and Mrs. Lewis Nixon, just before the party left New York. It is probably the most elaborate flag ever seen in Fredericton, being of heavy silk beautifully made and surrounded by a heavy gold fringe. Surmounting the stand on which the flag is carried a massive thistle is to be placed and is being made at one of the big mills controlled by Mr. Nixon, who is America's leading naval construction expert.

Active Recruiting Not Allowed. Lt. Col. Guthrie did not return with the party today, having been delayed for a day in New York to confer with Brig. Gen. White, the Officer Commanding the British Recruiting Mission. Colonel Guthrie is in Boston today and is expected to arrive here tomorrow, remaining here until next Monday when he will take the troops now here to Valcartier Camp to join the main body of the Battalion, thus closing up the depot in Fredericton.

Active recruiting for the 236th Battalion was not allowed while the party were in the United States, but it is expected that within the next few days a number of men from New York and other cities will come here—some of them at their own expense—to join the Klittes.

236TH DEPOT HERE WILL BE CLOSED ON MONDAY NEXT

All Troops Now Located Here Will Leave for Valcartier on that Day.

REAR PARTY TO REMAIN HERE TO CLEAN UP

"Break" Occurred at Old Government House During Week.

The depot which the 236th Overseas Battalion—the MacLean Klittes of America—have maintained in Fredericton since the main body of the battalion went to Valcartier will probably be closed on Monday, July 30th. That is the date which has been tentatively set, it was learned today, for the closing of the depot, and all the troops now located here will leave that day for Valcartier Camp, with the exception of a rear party who will remain here for a few days in charge of the quartermaster, Capt. J. D. Black, to finally clean and close up the barracks.
