Right Honorable Arthur Meighen, House of Commons, Ottawa, Canada.

My dear Mr.Meighen:

I have your letter of the 13th.

The problem confronting us all is one which requires careful study so that we can conserve the coal supply and utilize that which is going to waste every hour of the day. Canada is interested in this just as much as the United States because while it is very proper that you should develop and conserve your own resources, you would not see us suffer if our coal supply should run out and you had a supply. It is nothing but waste on the part of either Canada or the United States to let the water powers, which benefit no one, lie idle and go to waste as they are and suffer, as we have in the past year, by reason of laborr, transportation and poor coal supply.

I assure you we feel that it is a question of cooperation and these natural resources can be developed on a fair and equitable basis.
