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Am suggesting to Miss Robinson that she or John MacCormac might do something about it. I hesitate to do an article myself, at least a signed one, till my book is out, in view of what you said to me a few months ago. However, it made my blood boil to such an extent that I am trying to think out some way of doing something effective without jeopardizing the book. Shall be interested to hear what you think, if you can find time to drop me a line on the subject. Really, we are suffering from a total abdication of the critical faculty and of conscience in our public affairs, and not least among those persons who are usually called our "intellectuals". King's success (such as it is) appears to have dazzled a good many of them, so that it hardly even occurs to them to pass a judgment on the moral quality of his tactics. This alarms me more than almost anything else, when I think of the future.
