

Albert Ayres and S. L. Mann, comprising the firm of Ayres & Mann, are proprietors of a first-class livery at Wallaceburg. They own the prominent young stallion Starlight, sired by Gen. Brock, 2.317, he by Old Rooker. His dam was by old Bob Hunter 2.565, her dam being an Ethan Allen mare. Starlight was bred and raised by his present owners. Ayres & Mann have many good roadsters and several promising colts, all of their own breeding.

Geo. Hill is proprietor of the River House, Wallaceburg, and the owner of some fine trotting horses. As a genial landlord, he is known throughout Ontario. An expert fisherman and crack shot Mr. Hill is always ready for a sporting trip, and many of the boys come from Toronto and other points to enjoy an outing with mine host. Mr. Hill owns his own steam yacht, which pulls his flotilla of fishing, hunting and sleeping boats out on St. Clair Flats. His outfit is as complete as any sportsman's in Canada.

Dr. Jonathan McCulley, of Cedar Springs, has been a breeder of registered shorthorns for several years. A good sample of his stock may be seen in Princess 2d of Kent No. 417, vol 5.

Thomas Taylor, of Harwich, is an importer and breeder of Clydesdale and Cleveland bay horses. He has been many years in the business, always going abroad to make his own selections. Several of his importations can be found on best stock farms in the States. Craigie (18, 1051 and 2,036) was imported August, 1882. His pedigree shows him to be descended from the best strains of Clydesdale blood in Scotland. He has taken eight first prizes at various fairs.

Thomas Russell, of Charing Cross, owner of the Cedar Stock Farm, is one of the representative breeders of Leicester and Cotswold sheep and Suffolk pigs. His stock has taken one medal and several diplomas and first prizes at the fairs. Those desiring stock in his line would do well to correspond with him.

W. R. Laidlaw, veterinary surgeon, Blenheim, is a graduate of the Ontario Veterinary College, Toronto. Office and residence on Main street.

Wm. Burgess, of Cedar Springs, is the owner of three registered Clydesdale stallions; 3,182 Shylock, 1,915 Ardgowan and 65 Crown Prince. Shylock, when a yearling, was bought by Mr. Burgess for one thousand dollars. Ardgowan was imported when a yearling, and shortly after took the second prize at Ottawa. Shylock and Ardgowan are registered in the stud book.

Wm. Taylor, of Weldon, is the owner of the celebrated imported stallion Disraeli. Disraeli is a Cleveland bay, seven years old, and was imported in August, 1882, by Thomas Taylor, brother of the present owner. Mr. Taylor is also a breeder of registered shorthorns.

Charles McGuigan, of Cedar Springs, is a breeder of registered shorthorns. He has a fine herd of registered cattle, and has won many medals and first prizes. His bull Eric Prince (12,035) is a very fine animal. Mary Bell, a cow, (Dominion S. H. H. B.) is a good example of Mr. McGuigan's stock.

S. C. Bogart, veterinary surgeon, Chatham, is a graduate of the Ontario Veterinary College, Toronto. He has a large practice and the best of facilities for treating diseases in animals. He has a large sale and livery stable on Market square and Wellington street.

John Steen is a veterinary surgeon at Chatham. He is a graduate of the Ontario Veterinary College, Toronto. Diseases of domestic animals are treated in an efficient and qualified manner. His office is at Pierce's stables, Market Square.

Wm. Chrysler is proprietor of a first-class livery at Chatham.

James Jenkins, Colborne township, is a breeder of shorthorns and roadsters. His registered bull (all new book) The Minister, was bred by Hugh Thompson, of St. Mary's. His farm is in a high state of cultivation, and convenient to Goderich.

Alexander Bogie, postoffice Goderich, is owner of Archus Bourbon, bred by R. F. Aikers, Kansas. His sire was Bourbon Chief, sire of Calmar, record 2.234; son of Mambrino Chief, first dam Lily by Little Arthur; second dam by Gill's Vermont, sire of Bomber Boy; record 2.23. Mr. Bogie has several fine colts and can furnish some good roadsters.

H. W. Clark, lumberman, of Wallaceburg, was born in New York, later removing to Michigan, and finally to Canada. Mr. Clark having the eastern enterprise and tact is properly speaking a hustler.

John Robinson, horseshoer, of Dresden, has the trade of good horsemen in his vicinity. Thoroughly knowing the anatomy of the hoof, he treats all its diseases promptly and properly. He makes treatment of interfering a specialty.

Malcolm Campbell, of Maple Grove Stock Farm, two miles south of Erie street, Ridgeway, is a breeder of registered Canadian Clydesdale horses. Stud colts and fillies for sale.

John Little, Chatham, is a breeder of registered Berkshire pigs. He owns the promising young stallion Young Craigie, whose sire was Craigie, imported by Thomas Taylor. Mr. Little has several good brood mares and is making a specialty of Clydesdale horses and Berkshire pigs.
