#### KILLED IN EXPLOSION

Four Dead and Another Dying in Norfolk County.

nother Is Seriously Hurt-Boller of Sawmill Exploded, and the Employee Suffered By Pieces of the Demolished Machine Striking the Men-All the Victims Were Married Men-Cause Will

Woodstock, Jan. 21.—One of the worst boiler explosions in this district in years occurred at John Whitehead's saw-mill in the southern part of Norfolk County, early yesterday morning. As a result four are dead, one more fatally injured and another seriously hurt.

The dead are: George Asphen, George McCallum, Freeman Moffatt, Charles Panard.

Michael Asphen will not live and John Whitehead was severely bruised All, were employes at the "mill, and all the victims are married men. The deaths and the injuries were caused by pieces of the demolished engine striking the men. Parts of the iron were hurled 100 yards.

No cause is assigned for the explosion. It occurred while the engine was in operation, and the theory is that the water got too low in the boiler. The mill was completely wrecked, and the injured mon were terribly mangled.

"SUNRISE" EXPRESS WRECK.

Four Persons Seriously Hurt, But They Will Recover.

Durham, N. H., Jan. 21.—The "Sunrise" express, from Halifax and St. John for Boston, was wrecked yesterday morning a short distance west of the Durham station. Four cars were derailed and a number of persons were injured, four, seriously. No one was killed. The accident was

caused by a broken rail.

Those severely injured were: Miss
Belle Donald, Hampton, N.B., severe injuries to head and shoulder dis injuries to head and shoulder dis-located; colored porter of Pullman car, head and shoulders lacerated, and bruised by being thrown through car window; Albert Hall, Portland, Me., head and hip injured. It is thought all of these will recover. Seven other passengers sustained injuries necessitating, medical at-tendance, and a dozen or more sus-tained cuts and bruises of a minor nature.

The house with the contents was entirely consumed. There was no insurance.

Death By Carbolic Acid Brand Mau, Jan. 21 A Winnipeg woman committed suicide here some time during the night by taking carbolic acid. The woman, whose name was Mattle Borland, came from Winnipes on Wednesday night's train and proceeded to an east end resort, where her dead body was found yesterday morning. Her husband is an extraction of the second s engineer in Winnipeg.

Mrs. Reach's Douth.

Hamilton, Jan. 21.—The coroner's jury brought in this verdict last evening after hearing evidence in connection with the death last Monday evening of Mrs. D. J. Roach: "That Mrs. Catharine Roach did not come to her death through natural causes, but from causes unknown, taken with suicidal intent, we believe." The husband admitted that Words had passed between him and his wife the evening before her death. She did not eat any supper, and went to her room about 8 o clock. Her son and husband found her dead about 9.30. The doctors who conducted the autopsy did not give positive evidence, but stated that they believed that death did not result from natural causes.
