WALTZING MICE.

Waltzing mice are curious and interesting little animals. They are not quite so long as the common gray mouse and much more slender. They are spotted black and white at each end of their bodies and are clear white in the mid-dle. They whirl around on their four feet as if on a pivot, sometimes stopping and reversing the direction. Frequently I have seen two or three of them going around together in a large circle. Although they waitz sometimes as long as five minutes without rest


they appear never to get dizzy.

They can, if they choose, run in a straight line, but they seldom do. Instead of running away when disturbed or frightened they begin to waltz. They come out of their nests about sundown and waltz until nearly midnight. Then they go back to their nests to sleep.

One of the curious things about them is their fighting. They waltz until they run into each other, when they bite, start waltzing again. They keep this up until they are seriously injured, sometimes having their tails and legs bitten off and their skins torn.

There are several theories as to the reason they can whirl around in this way and yet do not get dizzy. One is that it is because of a disease of the brain that they inherit.

LAKE BAIKAL Vast Picos of Water Over Which Russ Has to Transport Her Troops for the Far East.

Lake Baikal, just now figuring so prominently in the war between Russia and Japan, as the former power has to transport all her troops over it, is a vast piece of water in Eastern Siberia. It is crescent shaped, and is surrounded by high and wild mountains rising to 3,000 and 4,000 feet above its waters. Its length from southwest to northeast is 370 miles, while its breadth varies from 20 to 70 miles. Its greatest depth is 4,500 feet, but the average depth of the southern part is about 800 feet. From the end of December to the



middle of May it is regularly frozen over, a railway being now in course of construction over the ice to carry the Russian troops. Lake Baikal forms part of the line of communication between Russia, the Amur and China, steamers plying between Listvenichoye, at the outlet of the Lower Ancora, and Posolskove in the delta Angora, and Posolskoye in the delta of Selenga. To accommodate these boats and to act as a station point off which the trans-Siberian trains run on to the train-ferrying steamer used to carry troops, the big floating dock service properties of the state of the stat dock seen in our sketch was built. The dock is also used by fishermen engaged in the salmon fisheries, some 60,000 cwt. of salmon being caught and cured annually.

The wardenship of the Cinque Ports, with residence at Walmer Castle, which has been conferred upon Lord Cúrzon during his holi-day from the duties of the Viceroyday from the duties of the vicety-alty of India, is an honorary post. Formerly it meant the duty of as-sembling, when necessary, the naval forces for coast defence, which cen-tred in the five ports. Now the tred in the five ports. Now the post is by custom conferred on some prominent British statesman as a special mark of distinction. In this case it gives to Lord Curzon a fine residence during his stay in England. He succeeds to a long line of cliustrious tenants. The late Lord Granville, Mr. Gladstone's Foreign Secretary, himself a Lord Warden, made a collection of nortraits of made a collection of portraits of holders of the office, which hang as heirlooms in the dining-room. They begin with Henry V., the builder of the castle, and include Admiral Blake and General Fleetwood, of the Blake and General Fleetwood, of the Cromwellian era, and among the latest Mr. W. H. Smith, Lord Dufferin and Lord Salisbury. The greatest Lord Wardens were Pitt and Wellington. Pitt turned the castle into a dwelling house, where he was wont to entertain the admirals of the fleet lying in the Downs during the long war with France, and where the Marquis Wellesley (brother of the Duke of Wellington) visited him on his appointment as Governor-General of India, a hundred and seven years ago.

We had not gone far before Her-bert was killed by a cannon ball. A moment or two after my right hand man had his head taken clean off by a round shot. His trunk kept upright on the horse for several yards and then fell over near me. Men and horses now gan to fall very fast, and we galloped

as hard as ever we could. We got among the guns at last, and if it was a proud moment for us the feeling was short lived. We fully expected to be supported, but when the smoke cleared we discovered that what we took for British troops were in re ality Russian cavalry. They came for us in a perfect cloud, and we faced about and rushed right into them. There was an awful clash of swords, and almost before we could realize it and almost before we could realize it we had cut right through them. This opened a passage for the remainder of the brigade and was the only real bit of fighting we had. The other was only slaughter.

HE CONSULTED BACON.

It was Andrew Jackson's habit to carry in his saddlebags when he attended court a copy of "Bacon's Abridgment" and to make frequent appeals to it in his cases. This precious book was always carefully done up in coarse brown paper, and the unwrapning of the volume was a very solemi function as performed by Jackson, who was then only twenty-one years old. WATCHMAKING.

There Are Eighty Separate Opera-tions Upon a Balance Wheel.

M. Favre-Peret, who investigated the ratchmaking industry in the New England states some years ago, stated that the average production of 49,000 work-men in Switzerland was forty watches each per annum, while in America the average was 150 fine watches for each

man employed.

By the aid of special machines in these watch factories one man can make 1,200 fine screws per day, some of which are so small that more than 100,000 are required to weigh a pound. One of the finest pieces made is a "pallet arbor," or pivotal bolt, which for a small sized watch has a thread of 260 to the inch, weighs 1-130,000 of a pound, undergoes 25 operations and costs but 2½ cents. Measurements are

costs but 24 cents. Measurements are gauged to 1-25,000 of an inch.

The balance wheel, after being machined, weighs only 7 grains and when fitted with 16 gold screws weighs 7.2 grains. There are 80 separate operations upon a balance wheel, 66 of them being drilling, threading and countersinking holes. The drills revolve at a record of 4 800 turns a migute and one Causes Much Distress to Throat and Lung
