ter may be used.

If possible, soup should be prepared entirely from fresh lean meat, or if a lettover from a roast is used a good sized piece of raw meat should be used

with it.
Cold ham is sometimes used white soups.

Long, slow and steady boiling is a necessity, and it should be so regulated that the soup pot will not re-quire replenishing. If additional water is added see that it is boiling hot or the soup will be spoiled. Remember, if meat is boiled too fast it toughers and will not exude its juice.

I knew of no better way to acquire perfect pose than this. They are put up inverted, so that all the housekeeper has to do is to hold the sugar bowl or measuring cup under, turn the knob and the food runs out. food runs out.

Mushreems as Gratin.
Cut the stems from a half pound of
mushrooms and put them aside to use
in a stew or soup. Wash the mushrooms, after stemming them, in cold
water to free them from dust, strip the skin from them, cut them in quarters and lay them in an earthen baking dish. When all the mushrooms are in pour over them enough rich cream to just come up to their level, put in a few pats of butter, season well with sait and freshly ground black pepper, cover the whole with fine bread-crumbs, then sift over the top a little grated Parmesan cheese. Stand the mushrooms bake till a rich brown over the surface. Then serve as an ac-companiment to broiled chicken or just as an entree for dinner.
