WE GET PORTLAND CANAL.

DECISION REACHED BY THE ALASKA TRIBUNAL.

May Give United States More Territory Than Now Held Under Modus Vivendi—Ottawa's Without Official Notification of the Decision—Formal Announcement to be Made To-day.

Ottawa, Oct. 19.—The cablegram yesterday from London announcing that a verbal decision had been reached by the Alaska tribunal adverse to all Canada's contentions, excepting those relating to the Portland Canal, is not officially confirmed here. In answer to inquiries it was stated that no official information had been received, and none was expected until the commission formally rendered judgment. Hence none of the Cabinet Ministers were prepared to discuss the subject or to say anything for publication. Nothing is said in the cablegram as to whether or not the judgment was unanimous. Upon that there is a keen desire for further information as well as to learn the details of the judgment. If the cable report is correct, the United States retains Dyce and Skagway and a substantial strip of coast, and Canada's contention that the southern line of demarcation runs from Cape Muzon north of Pearse and Wales Islands and up the Portland Canal, is sustained.

London, Oct. 19.—The Alaskan boundary commission reached an agreement whereby all the American contentions are sustained, with the exception of those in relation to the Portland Canal, which Canada wins. All that now remains to be done is for the commissioners to affix their signatures to the decision and the map which will accompany it. On the map will be marked the boundary line definitely fixing the division of American and British territory on such a basis that no American citizen will lose a foot of land he already believed he held, while the United States will get all the waterways to the rich Alaska territory with the exception of the Portland Canal, which gives Canada the one outlet she so much needed.

The long standing dispute was settled only after a week of secret deliberation between the arbitrators. Up to noon there was a possibility that a disagreement might result and the whole proceedings fall to the ground. Lord Alverstone, though openly inclined to believe in the justice of the American argument, that the United States was entitled to the heads of inlets, as contained in question five, held out that Canada had established her case in question two and three, dealing with the Portland Canal.

After luncheon Senator Lodge, Secretary Root and Senator Turner agreed to cede these points and to start the American boundary line from the head of the Portland Canal, thus giving the Canadians that channel and some small islands on which there are only a few disused storehouses. This accomplished, the majority of the tribunal agreed to fix, with this exception, the entire boundary line as outlined in the American case.

Whether Mr. Aylesworth and Sir Louis Jetté, the Canadian commissioners, will refuse to sign the decision, and make it unanimous, is as yet unknown. But it will not affect the validity of the agreement if a minority report is submitted.

NOVA SCOTIA BANK ROBBED.

Thieves Crack the Safe at St. Andrew's, N.B.

St. Andrew's, N.B., Oct. 19.—The Bank of Nova Scotia at this place was burglarized on Friday night or early Saturday. The safe was completely wrecked and all the money taken. The amount has not been learned, but it is thought it will run into the thousands. Horse blankets, robes and other heavy wrappings were swathed about the safe to deaden the noise. A neighboring blacksmith shop was entered and tools stolen. A C.P.R. hand car is missing also.

WEST HASTINGS LIBERALS.

Strong Protest Against the Redistribution Bill Amendment.

Belleville, Oct. 19.—The Belleville Ontario, the Liberal organ of this city, states that if the Government persists in abiding by the amendment made to the redistribution bill, by which the first arrangement was changed, the West Hastings Reform Club will disband and sell its two billiard tables, and the two ridings of Hastings will be given to the Conservatives by acclamation at the next election. The above action, The Ontario says, was decided on at a largely attended meeting of the Reform Club last night. It is expected that this action will influence the Senate to make certain changes in the bill.

FIFTEEN MEN KILLED.

Laborers Meet Death in Railway Collision Near Washington, N.J.

Trenton, N.J., Oct. 19.—Fifteen persons were killed and about forty more injured in a collision between a work train and a gravel train, which occurred to-day on the Belvedere division of the Pennsylvania Railroad Company near Washington Crossing. The persons killed and injured were Italian laborers, who were on a work train, and were on their way to work at Washington Crossing to repair washouts along the road. The bodies have been taken from the wreck.

El. J. Edelson, his wife, Joseph H. Edelson and Robert Edelson of Chicago, tobacco merchants, were arrested at Montreal on a charge of defrauding their creditors. About \$14,000 was taken from them.

MEAFORD'S MAYOR HONORED.

Citizens' Address and Presentation to Dr. Hamill.

Meaford, Oct. 19.—On Friday an at-home was given here by the citizens in honor of Mayor J. D. Hamill, D.D. S. Dr. Hamill was first elected Mayor of Meaford in January, 1897, and has since that date been continuously in office, having been elected from year to year by acclamation. During the evening the doctor was presented with an illuminated address and a purse containing \$500. During his tenure of office Meaford has become one of the leading grain ports on the Georgian Bay, and numerous manufacturing industries have been established in the town. It was in recognition of his services as Mayor that the presentation was made.

ALL SAFELY RESCUED.

Women's and Children's Refugee at Montreal Burned.

Montreal, Oct. 19.—The Ladies' Benevolent Institution, on Berthelet street, was damaged to the extent of \$5,000 early Saturday by fire and water. Fireman Brophy was badly burned about the face and neck, and had to be removed to the General Hospital. Firemen Pilote and Roberts of No. 6 received painful burns about the face and hands. The building at the time contained 120 children and 18 infant old women, and great excitement prevailed.

When the alarm was first sounded, the officials were able to prevent a tumult and to direct the inmates to a place of safety. Firemen from fourteen different stations responded to the call, and soon the flames were under control. The origin of the fire is unknown. The place was fully insured.

THE MARKET REPORTS.

Grain is Higher—The Cheese Trade—Fair Demand for Live Stock.

Saturday Evening, Oct. 17

Toronto St. Lawrence Markets.

Notwithstanding the bad weather, trade was brisk on St. Lawrence Market today. Receipts were well up to the standard, and farmers' stocks were pretty well cleared up. The grain receipts amounted to 1,400 bushels.

Wheat—The market was firm and unchanged, except for spring wheat, which is down to 80c. Two hundred bushels of hard red at 82c, 100 bushels of red at 82c, 100 bushels of goose at 74c, and 100 bushels of spring at 80c.

Barley—Barley was unchanged. About 600 bushels sold at 42c to 50c.

Oats—Yesterday's prices prevailed, the market being firm at 32c to 33c a bushel.

Dressed Hogs—There was no change over yesterday's prices of 47 to 48 for heavy and light hogs.

Hay—About 20 loads sold at \$10 to \$11 for No. 1 timothy and \$8 to \$9 for the mixed quality, the prices being unchanged since yesterday.

Straw—One load of straw was sold at \$11, which price holds firm.

Butter—Was plentiful, fairly good stock being cleared up. 22c to 23c per pound.

Eggs—Took a jump to 30c for the new-laid, and there were not many in. Others not guaranteed strictly fresh sold as low as 25c to 26c.

Poultry—There was a large supply of poultry of all kinds on sale, and a good deal of it was disposed of, though the quality was nothing extra. The prices for turkeys sold pretty well at 14c to 16c per pound; geese, 7c to 9c; ducks, 10c to 12c; and chickens, 8c to 10c.
