Letters within the Dominion and to the United States and Mexico, Great Britain and all parts of the British Empire, 2 cents per ounce or fraction thereof. In addition to the postage necessary, each letter must have affixed a one-cent "War Tax" stamp. To other countries, 3 cents for the first ounce, and 3 cents for each additional ounce. Letters to which the 5-cent rate applies do not require the "War Tax" stamp. Post Cards one cent each to any address in Canada, United States and Mexico. One cent post cards must have a one-cent "War Stamp" affixed, or a two-cent card can be used. Post cards two cents each to other countries. The two-cent card also requires the "War Tax" stamp. Newspapers and periodicals, to any address in Canada, United States and Mexico, one cent per four ounces. Arrives: 12:30 p.m. Closes: 4:55 p.m. Mails for Deer Island, Indian Island, Campobello—Daily Arrives: 11 a.m. Closes: 12:30 p.m. All Matter for Registration must be Post paid to be put in the Office of Ordinary Mail. TORONTO PAPER ASKS SHALL QUEBEC RULE?

Toronto, Nov. 30.—Under the heading "Shall Quebec Rule?" the News says today in front page editorial: "Are the Laurier Liberals seeking to light the fires of civil war? It was only by the indulgence of fortune that men and women were not killed in Sherbrooke last night, if one had been slain, particularly if that one had been a returned soldier, of whom many were present, there would have been a roar of furious disapproval through out eight of the nine provinces of Confederation."

RECORD ONE CENT COINAGE

Philadelphia, December 1.—With an unprecedent demand for one-cent pieces, the coinage of the Philadelphia Mint in November was the largest of any month in its history. The total was 69,640,445 pieces. During the calendar year of 1916, the coinage amounted to 269,840,097 pieces, including 31,376,380 foreign pieces. For eleven months of the present year it was 278,096,998 pieces including 6,222,324 for foreign governments.
