

### RECRUITING WILL RE-COMMENCE

Advent of 215th to City Will See Renewed Activity.

**WILL BE BIG CAMPAIGN**  
Good Results Accomplished Here During the Summer.

With the return of the second Brants to Brantford for the winter, after an absence of several months at Camp Niagara, it is fitting that some tribute should be paid to Pte. Tatt and his associates, who have conducted the affairs of the battalion so well. Since August 10th, 29 recruits have been secured, and many more prospects have been lined up. In addition to this, eight applicants for enlistment have been refused a medical examination, and fourteen men have been found unable to meet the strict military requirements and have been rejected. Although the 215th battalion have been exceptionally free from deserters and those absent without leave, those few among the soldiers who did get into difficulties under this heading were also looked after. Immediately upon the return of the battalion to-day, a great recruiting campaign is to be inaugurated, when a final effort will be made to complete the battalion in three months. In this regard, all the recruiting signs about the city have been taken down, including the two large boards in Victoria and Alexandra parks, and will be replaced by new ones. This work has also been done by the above mentioned members of the battalion.

Thus, while the results may not seem as satisfactory as the condition of affairs would warrant it will be seen that the local recruiters are not responsible for the dearth of recruits, as every effort possible has been put forth by them in this respect.

#### LADY'S HOUSE DRESS.

A proper autumn model for practical wear is shown in this illustration. It indicates that the interest in the dress with a separate blouse to be worn outside the skirt is being gradually revived. Those in sympathy with the Russian blouse will perhaps class this model as really better than a house dress, and accordingly, choose a material that will take it out of the commonplace. The blouse, as pictured, is made with the body and short sleeves in one section, but it may be made with set-in long sleeves. The collar, sleeve cuff, belt and pocket are of material in opposing color, to suit the prevailing mode, but all one material will give a neat effect. The upper portion of the blouse is semi-fitting and below it is finished with what appears to be a gathered plastron, but which is really a continuation of the blouse belted in at normal waist line. The three gore gathered skirt, measuring in size 36 2 1/2 yards at the lower edge, flares and ripples identity. You can reproduce the design just as you see it pictured, with the pattern before you. The dress pattern, No. S.8001, is cut in sizes 36 to 42 bust measure. To make in size 36 will require 1 1/2 yards of 36 inch material and 3/4 yard of contrasting goods. Or 6 yards all one material. ### SMITH COMMITTED FOR COURT TRIAL

Jail Breaker and Desperado to Appear in Fall Assizes Here.

Identified by Turnkey Cook as Man Who Assaulted Him.

William Smith was arraigned in the police court once more this morning, to face the adjourned charges against him of assault, jail breaking and bicycle theft. After the taking of evidence, he was committed by Magistrate Livingston for trial at the first court of competent jurisdiction.

The only evidence taken was the assault cases. Jail Governor Brown and Turnkey Cook both taking the witness stand and giving their testimony, which was practically a resume of what has already been told. Mr. Cook positively identified Smith as the one who assaulted him, and stated that the two men were concerned in the attack on Mr. Brown. The stolen bicycles were not produced, owing to a delay in their transportation, so the theft case was relegated. Smith will appear at the fall assizes on Oct. 24th next. He was represented this morning by Mr. H. Hewitt.

Continued from Page One don hospital, according to word received yesterday by his mother, Mrs. Slattery, 112 West Mill St. The information was conveyed in a letter from Pte. T. Slattery of the 125th, a brother of the wounded man.

Harold Chaplin  
Pte. Harold Chaplin, wounded, is a Paris boy, employed previous to his enlistment as a hoseier borderer at Penman's mill there. He is unmarried and 21 years of age. He enlisted in the active service contingent of the Dufferin Rifles which left Brantford on Nov. 6, 1914, and became attached to the 19th battalion.

Corp. A. Stroude  
Corp. Aubrey Stroude of Norwich was reported this morning as having been killed in action.

Other Names  
This morning's casualty list contained several other local names: Pte. A. S. Post, and Pte. W. W. Precious, wounded, and Pte. H. Cox, Paris, died from wounds. All of these have already been reported in the Courier.

Pte. Fred Wade  
Pte. Fred Wade, formerly of Waterloo St., in this city, who enlisted in the 25th Brant Dragoons, and Princess Patricia Regiment, has again been wounded at the Somme, shrapnel wounds in arms and back, and transferred to one of the hospitals at Wimbledon, England.

He left Canada with one of the early contingents, and was severely wounded and buried in one of the shell craters. After removed, he was treated in various hospitals, suffering from above, also shock and partial blindness. He was an inmate of the hospital at Ramsgate when it was struck by a Zeppelin bomb. Recovering sufficiently, he was again sent to the front about 6 weeks ago, and was in one of the bomb throwing contingents.

His wife and two children left Brantford last January to be near him during his sickness, and are still at Ramsgate, but are able to visit him at the hospital at Wimbledon. They hope he may again be sent to their hospital at Ramsgate, after he has been operated on in London.

About 370 Hamilton men have been reported killed in action or died of wounds, and about fifty dependents of these men are benefiting by the Soldiers' Insurance Fund.
