THE NEWS IN BRIEF

THE WEEK'S HAPPENINGS TOLD IN A FEW LINES.

All the News Condensed in as Brief a Form as Possible for Reporter Readers.

Iroquois is now lighted with electricity.
An organ factory has been established in Galt, Ont.
There were 38 deaths from cholera at Cairo, Egypt.
Four American teachers were murdered by Filipinos.
The Australian team won the Kolo-pore Cup at Bialay.
The U. S. has 5,739,657 farms, valued at \$16,674,694,247.
The U. S. is importing 6,000 or 8,000 tons of iron and steel daily.
Work has started on the re building of the C.P.R. car-shop at Perth.
An important strike of gas and oil is reported in Romney township.
Geo. Duff, for many years a resident of Brockville, died on Thursday last.
Lord and Lady Minto arrived at New York on their return to Canada.
Lieut. Burnside, of Toronto has been appointed to the South African police.
A branch of the Leeds and Grenville Old Boys has been formed in Ottawa.
The Toronto firemen's fund is now only a few hundred dollars short of \$50,000.
Mrs. John Creilly was killed by lightning at her home in High Park, Toronto.
Toronto, Kingston, Ottawa and Brockville all have their civic holidays on Aug. 4.
A Smith's Falls paper says there are twenty-two cases of consumption in that town.
The yacht, Hully Gee, upset off Newcastle. W. Griffith, of Hamilton, was drowned.
July 25th was the eighty-eighth anniversary of Canada's great victory at Lundy's Lane.
The estimated losses of the anthracite coal strike up to date are placed at \$56,448,000.
Mrs. John L. McDonald, of Gananoque, died in Ottawa last week at the age of eighty-five.
The tax rate for Stratford, Ont., for the present year will be twenty-four mills on the dollar.
Col. Dent states that he has spent over a million and a half dollars for remounts in Canada.
The Trappist Monastery at Oka, Quebec, was destroyed by fire. The loss is \$150,000 or \$20,000.
Norman Reid, a Toronto lad, was drowned while attempting to swim across Mimico Creek.
Warner North, a seven-year-old Westport boy, died last week from the effects of a sunstroke.
The Dominion Supply Co., Limited, of Ottawa, is about to establish a branch at Brockville.
Mr. Finley Osborne, of Belleville, died suddenly at Wellington on Thursday of heart disease.
Three men were drowned and dozen missing as a result of a furious wind storm at Vancouver, B.C.
A large number of English school teachers will visit Canada this fall in the interests of education.
Sir Oliver Mowat, lieutenant-governor of Ontario, celebrated his eighty-third birthday on Thursday.
There are at present twenty prisoners in Perth gaol, an unusually large number for this time of year.
General DeWet has been offered £250 weekly and expenses for a lecturing tour in the United States.
The Landlords of Ireland have formed a combine with \$500,000 capital to fight the United Irish league.
The British Gov't has decided to send parties of Boers to Australia and Canada to study agricultural methods.
A whistling solo is the latest thing in the line of music to be introduced into divine services in a New York church.
The house and outbuildings of Maj. Jos. P. Redmond, a well known farmer of Escott, were destroyed by fire recently. Maj. Redmond was the man who had charge of the big Canadian cheese at the World's Fair in Chicago.

Lord Dundonald the new General Officer Commanding the Canadian Militia, was given a hearty welcome at Ottawa.

Oil has been discovered in large quantities in the Island of Trinidad and is being worked under auspices of Canadians.

The King will only remain in London three days for the coronation, going there on the 8th and returning on the 11th.

An American officer was fined \$50 and suspended for one month for allowing the "water cure" to be administered in the Philippines.

In a year 30,000,000 Methodists throughout the world will be celebrating the two hundredth birthday of John Wesley.

The business places of Cardinal close three nights in each week during the months of May, June, July, August and September.

Mrs. Duncan McDonald, of Vank-leek Hill, gave birth last week to four children, two boys and two girls. All are doing well.

Counterfeiters are at work in Deseronto, one dollar bill which had been cleverly raised to a \$10 was passed there last week.

King Edward has contributed a further sum of \$30,000 for the relief of the sufferers by the eruption of Mt. Pelee, Martinique.

Arnprior clerks are likely to have nine o'clock closing on Saturday nights. Nearly all the merchants signed a petition to that effect.

Private Espie and Trumpeter Davy, of the Canadian Mounted Rifles, were drowned in the Assiniboine river at Winnipeg on Thursday.

Although Kingston sent more soldiers to South Africa than any other town in Canada, not one of them was killed or died of disease.

A C.P.R. passenger train on the Guelph branch was derailed and a half a dozen passengers were injured, none very seriously, on Friday.

St. Petersburg despatches state that Britain, Japan and Korea have signed an agreement maintaining the independence of the latter country.

Trooper Gregson of the Second Mounted Rifles, who belongs to Brandon, Man., died on an intercolonial on Saturday near Montreal.

John B. Earl, a deaf mute of Brockville, was run over by a train while walking on the track near Deseronto, and killed, last Wednesday.

The vacancy in the Ottawa high school has been filled by the appointment of Mr. R. Stevenson, late head master of Perth high school.

Japan is sending a warship to Marcus Island, of which she claims possession, to prevent the landing of a private expedition from the United States.

The Japanese fishermen at Vancouver have gone on strike and are using force to compel the whites engaged in the same industry to join with them.

Census returns show that during the last half century 3,000,000 people have emigrated from Ireland, 80 per cent going to the United States.

The 60 foot mapha launch, Regina, owned by Mr. S. L. Clayton, of the Philadelphia Yacht Club, shot the Le-chine rapps, being the first and only one to do it.

Boly Cryant, a negro, is to be hanged next month at Savannah for the murder of W. A. Hyers. The death trap will be sprung by the daughter of the murdered man.

One of the most brutal murders on record is reported from Halifax. An ex-soldier cut his wife's head off with a razor and then calmly went to sleep in bed beside the corpse.

A "belt line" from Dawson to Klondyke city, 85 miles, is to be constructed. The surveys have been made and the rails contracted for. The cost will be about \$4,000,000.

The Ontario Municipal Association will meet in Brockville on September 11th and 12th. The principal subject for discussion is the report of the royal assessment commission.

During the recent floods at Jamestown a boy was swept into a sewer and travelled 1,000 feet in less than three minutes. He came out at the other end uninjured and was able to crawl to safety.

The Lord's Day Alliance has succeeded, temporarily at least, in suppressing the Sunday sale of ice cream soda by Toronto druggists. One of the latter has been fined \$20 for the offence. He will appeal.

Oil and gas are reported in Caledonia Township, Prescott County.

General Dewet was the guest of honor at a banquet at Cape Town.

Earthquake shocks were experienced in California and South Dakota.

The Soufriere volcano in St. Vincent has been slightly in eruption again.

Many deaths from cholera occurred in Egypt, Manchuria and the Philippines.

Manitoba Government intervention has no effect on the Canadian Northern strike.

Nearly 100 British warships will take part in the coronation review off Spithead, August 11th.

The Australian cricket team in England won the test match against All England by three runs.

The freedom of Edinburgh was conferred on Sir Wilfrid Laurier and the other colonial premiers.

The farmers in Western Ontario are complaining of sprouted wheat owing to continued wet weather.

The monument at Ottawa for the soldiers who fell in South Africa will be unveiled on Aug. 11.

Deaths from cholera in Manchuria from July 15 to July 23 numbered 106 Russians and 276 Chinese.

Two houses, built in Montreal 100 years ago, and looked upon as historic relics, were burned recently.

General Lucas Meyer, formerly commander of the Orange Free State forces, has arrived in England.

The United Irish League has entered a charge of conspiracy against the recently formed landlords' combine.

Miss Amy Wilson, a seventeen-year-old girl of Hamilton, has disappeared from her father's farm at Copetown.

Over 12,000 members are in attendance at the sixth triennial festival of German singing societies opened at Graz.

Reports that Mr. Chamberlain is seriously ill are authoritatively denied. He is able to attend to his duties at the Colonial Office.

An excursion party of seven hundred from Syracuse, N. Y., on the steamer New York, was not allowed to land at Kingston on Sunday.

One hundred arrests were made in Paris Sunday in connection with the disturbances arising out of the closing of the religious schools.

Miss Etta Beatty of Parry Sound and Mr. Frank Cross were drowned at Two-mile Narrows, the latter while attempting to rescue the young lady.

There is a project to take 100,000 men from Great Britain to South Africa to work in the mines of that country. Good wages will be offered.

Mr. Chamberlain announced that those not of South African birth, who fought against the British in South Africa, will not be allowed to return to that country.

In the re-shoot for the McKinnon cup, which was won by Australia, but the contest for which was ordered to be shot over, the Canadian rifle team at Bielew won with a score of 1,375.

Premier Roblin, of Manitoba, has returned from his trip to England where he went to see the coronation ceremonies. He says he fears the colonial conference will prove abortive.

The annual statement of the C. P. R. shows gross earnings for twelve months up to June 30 of \$37,503,054, working expenses \$23,417,142, net profits \$14,085,912, an increase of net profits over 1901 of \$1,976,537.

Jeffries knocked out Fitzsimmons in the eighth round at San Francisco last Friday night.

The latest bulletin issued by his physicians says that the King is making satisfactory progress. In London, however it is persistently announced that the coronation will be again postponed.

The deaths reported from all localities in the province last month were 1,796, as compared with 1,608 for June of last year. There were 202 deaths from tuberculosis as against 74 last year.

Diplomatic relations between Italy and Switzerland, which were ruptured owing to the publication in a newspaper in the latter country of insulting articles regarding the late King Humbert, have been resumed.

Major T. W. Symons, in his annual report to the United States government, recommends the expenditure of \$40,000 on the improvement of the shoals of the St. Lawrence River between Ogdensburg and the foot of Lake Ontario.

Last Wednesday afternoon, Dr. E. H. Horsey, M.P. for North Grey was killed in his cement factory at Owen Sound, by the bursting of a fly wheel.

The Sun Portland Cement Works, of which deceased was the principal promoter and stockholder, had only been in operation a few days.

The last issue of the Canada Gazette contains a notice that Ronald Miles Smith, of Obstererville, will apply at its next session for a bill of divorce from his wife, Grace Smith, formerly of the township of Winchester, now of the State of Minnesota, on the grounds of bigamy and adultery.
