Mr I. C. Alguire, Athens, has been appointed census commissioner for Brockville riding and Mr Guy Curtis of Delta for Leeds.

The members of the Pansy Mission Band will give a free programme of music during the purchasing of articles from 3 to 6 on Saturday, April 8th.

Mr and Mrs F. H. Eaton, Mundane, Alta., announce the engagement of their youngest daughter, Alma, to Mr Carlyle Milne, of Kamusack, Alta., the wedding to take place the last of April.

The engagement is announced of Miss Jean Lois Bryson, only daughter of Mrs Robert Bryson, Lyn, to Dr. James Edwin Bracken, of Kinley, Sask., the marriage to take place early in May.

An order in council has been passed appointing Mr J. H. Grisdale, formerly Dominion Agriculturist, as director of Experimental Farms, to succeed Dr. William Saunders, who recently retired. The new appointment takes effect at once.

Hon. William Pugsley has given orders that the Union Jack shall be displayed every day in the year except Sundays from sunrise to sunset upon every public building in the cities and towns of the Dominion.

We regret to have to state that for several days Mr Alex Taylor has been seriously ill. Many anxious enquiries are made by friends in village and country, and to these the reply is given that his condition remains unchanged.

The Government Post Office Savings Bank will now accept up to \$5,000 on deposit, giving the same interest as the chartered banks, 3 per cent. The amount accepted on deposit per year has been increased from \$1,000 to \$1,500.

Charles Sheldon, the financial wizard, so called, whose operations in Montreal caused so many people to feel both happy and sad, and whose sudden departure was the great sensation of a few months ago was captured at Pittsburg, and will be brought back to Montreal for trial.

At a temperance convention in Kingston it was decided to institute a campaign for local option in Kingston and the three townships in Frontenac which are yet under liquor license law.

The children of the Mission Band of the Methodist church will serve tea on Saturday next from 3 to 6 and an entertaining programme will be rendered during the afternoon. The very moderate charge of 5c. will be made. The Band will also offer for sale some useful articles.

The 12th of July will be celebrated in Westport this year. Westport L.O.L. No 47, and Bedford Mills P.A.P.B. No 46 will hold a joint celebration in Adams' grove that day. A big time is expected.

The weather has been anything but favorable for the maple syrup makers. Some farmers tapped three weeks ago and up to date have been able to make only a few gallons. The season will now probably be brief, but the farmers may yet have a good "run" for their money.

John R. Dargavel, M.L.A. has secured the following special grants for colonization roads in Leeds; Westport and Sherbrooke road, \$150; New Boyne school road, \$300; Ecott road, \$100; Dead Creek road, \$200; Bedford Mills and Opinicon road, \$200.

Last Saturday evening, on invitation, about thirty young people surprised Master Everett King with a visit. The evening's entertainment included an abundance of hot sugar and wax, and a very jolly time was spent.

The new minimum salary schedule contemplated by the Presbyterian Church is: Ontario and Quebec, \$900 and manse; Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, \$1000 and manse; British Columbia, \$1,100.

Mr and Mrs Charles Fisher of Danphin, Man., and Mr Arthur Fisher of Regina are here this week owing to the serious illness of Mr D. Fisher. During the past week Mr Fisher's condition has shown a slight improvement.

On Easter Sunday in the Methodist church there will be a service for old people in the morning and a young people's service in the evening. The choral music, morning and evening, will be furnished by the young people of the congregation.

Those opposed to the Local Option By-law in Renfrew carried the case to the Supreme Court. Leave to appeal was refused, the court holding that it was a Provincial matter, and having been decided by the Provincial Courts, the Supreme Court should not exercise the discretion vested in it of granting leave to appeal from their decisions.

Among those leaving for the West this week were R. Leader, J. Hockey, J. Hudson, of McIntosh Mills, for Edmonton; E. Jackson, of Greenbush, for Moose Jaw, Sask.; F. W. Trickey, of Toledo, for Winnipeg; Charles McCready, of Lyn, for Saskatoon, Sask.

Owing to the public thank-offering service to be held in the Methodist church on Good Friday, under the auspices of the W.M.S., the regular monthly meeting has been withdrawn for this week.

Horse racing is dead in New York State for this year at least. The Jockey Club issued a statement Friday night saying that because of adverse legislation it had been decided to make no application for dates. This news came out almost simultaneously with the reports from New Orleans that the horse owners believe the sport beyond revival there.

Last week we reported the sleighing finished with a record of 120 days, but on Thursday a second consignment of winter arrived and we have since had a resumption of sleighing with a temperature that has run down to 6 above zero. Less than a year ago wild flowers were being gathered in this section.

At the meeting to be held in Brockville on Friday, at which Hon. Adam Beck will be present, Athens will be represented by Reeve Holmes.

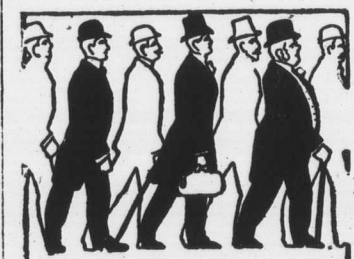

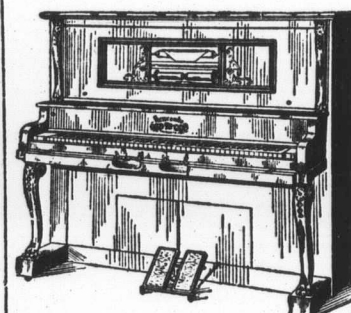
