A CHINAMAN'S CRIME.

Buffalo has a sensation, points out the Ottawa Citizen. A little six-year-old girl of that city has been found murdered after having been outraged. The result of the police investigation has been the issuance of a warrant for the arrest of Charlie Wee, a Hudson street laundryman, on a charge of murder in the first degree. The discovery of the crime and the suspicious circumstances indicating Wee as the guilty party aroused public feeling against local Chinese to an intense pitch and they have had to be accorded police protection from mob violence. It may be that the accused is not guilty and that he will be able to clear himself of the charge of committing a most diabolical crime; but should he not, should he have been guilty of the outrage and murder, it would be manifestly unfair to brand all Chinese as alike criminal. Such a method of dealing with native Canadian criminals would do grave injustice to a peaceable, law-abiding people whose general conduct has at intervals been marred by the acts of fiends in human shape. The admitted inefficiency of the Chinaman as we have come to know him in this country should stand Charlie Wee in good stead, and in any case save his fellow-countrymen from unjust suspicion and harsh treatment.

NO COMPROMISE.

That suggestion given out by the Peterborough Times that there is talk of a coalition is rather of the fairy-tale order. The Times is an independent paper, fairly expert in producing rumors, but this time it seems to have gone off at a tangent. Peterborough is Hon. J. B. Stratton's town, and that also may account for the starting of the rumor there. Mr. Stratton is among those who have made politics profitable; at all events he has amassed wealth since getting into politics. It is just possible, therefore, that he would favor a coalition if he were given a portfolio, and that he gave out the whisper as a feeler. Hon. J. M. Gibson is another minister who has grown wealthy since he got into active politics; Mr. Dryden is supposed to have made the money which he invested in his Dakota ranch out of the people of Ontario; Hon. Elihu Davis is said to have been closely in touch with the North Waterloo inquiry; Hon. Mr. Harcourt did not make a first class success in handling the finance portfolio and was changed off to the education department. He was always sure to figure out a surplus, however, and stuck to that to the last.

Just fancy Sir William Meredith coming down from his high position on the bench to preside over a cabinet composed in part of such men! Who could imagine Col. J. P. Whitney and J. J. Foy compromising with those who have resorted to all sorts of corruption to deprive them of their rights? Oh, no; we do not believe there is any foundation for the rumor. It is now found that Lennox remains Conservative; that Mr. Carleton has been confirmed in his seat. North Grey will yet be placed in the Conservative column; and "there are others." The Minority Government must go, and by the time the courts get through with the recounts and appeals and protests, Mr. Whitney will have a good working majority. Whitney and Foy and their colleagues are not likely to coalesce with men whose tenure of office has been prolonged by the most flagrant dishonesty.
