## THE MILLS OF JUSTICE

Colborne Street Families Air Troubles in Police Court

Belle Calender Charges Bessie Ray with Insulting Language

Two quarrelling families from Colborne street aired their troubles in Judge Houston's Court this morning. The case arose out of a series of hard names which they heaped on each other during a recent row.

"Your Honor, she called me a black —," chimed Belle Calender, when she arose to pour forth the indignant story of her wrongs.

"And she called me and my sisters, — and white brats," retorted Bessie Ray, whom the Calender girl charged with insulting language.

The case was too disgusting to be of general interest. Judge Houston after hearing the evidence, adjourned it till Thursday morning. Thomas Scullard appeared for the defense.

Junk Dealer Brenson has not yet returned from Toledo, and on this account, the estate stealing case had to be again adjourned this morning. The Eady fast driving and cruelty to animals case was also adjourned for further evidence.

Wing Lung, a Chinese laundryman from over the river, had a young man named Arnold up this morning, charged with stealing \$5 from his laundry on Empire Day.

Arnold pleaded guilty, and his case was remanded till Monday morning.

Geo. Prout applied to Judge Houston to have his suspended sentence removed this morning. He was given six hours in the cells, at the end of which time he was a free man with no penalty over his head.

A man named Frank Emerick, from Zone, charged with assault, was found guilty by Judge Dowlin, this morning, and fined \$25. As he did have the money, he had to take 30 days in jail.

He was working on a new barn at Wilfrid Watson's, New Scotland, and was sawing a plank near the top of the building, when the plank on which he was standing slipped and he fell twenty-five feet to the plank floor. He struck on his head and shoulders, and was so severely injured that he did not regain consciousness for ten hours. He is now recovering.

## DEATH OF GEO. TURRILL OCCURS AT SEATTLE

The sad news has been received in this city of the death of George F. Turrill, formerly of this city, at Seattle, Wash. Particulars of his death are lacking, but some time ago, when Mr. Turrill passed through this city, he appeared to be in the best of health and spirits. To a Planet reporter, who met him on that occasion, which was but a few months ago, he said that he never felt better in his life, that change of climate agreed with him, and he intimated that he had met with considerable good fortune in real estate deals in Seattle.

The late Mr. Turrill for years conducted a shoe business in what is now known as Hodges' shoe store. A few years ago he took Mr. Hodges in as a business partner, and later, owing to ill-health, he sold out his share in the business to Mr. Hodges, and left for Seattle, where he had since been engaged in the insurance business.

The deceased was of a modest, retiring disposition, rather reserved in his mannerism until one became intimately acquainted with him. He was considered a good business man and was highly esteemed by all who knew him.

## SON MURDERS HIS MOTHER

Wm. McKie Kills His Aged Parent Then Suicides

Village of Bright Shocked By a Double Tragedy

Woodstock, May 28.—A double tragedy, which occurred on Friday evening last in the Village of Bright, 16 miles northeast of here, has been discovered, involving the lives of Miss Jennie McKie, aged 71, and her son, William McKie, aged 47, formerly a well-known school teacher of Oxford County. The lifeless bodies were found in Miss McKie's home, in the village, while a half-filled bottle of chloroform revealed the means employed.

The facts, as known, are as follows: William McKie, for the last 15 years a successful druggist of Kalamazoo, Michigan, reached home for the only time since first leaving it, Friday evening last at 5 p.m., via the G.T.R. He was seen to go to his home, and John McKie, a brother of the murdered woman, and his wife were at the house, staying for supper. They noticed nothing peculiar in his manner or appearance. Neither he nor his mother were seen alive again.

Miss McKie was found in bed, evidently having been drugged while asleep. William McKie, the murderer, was found in a half-dressed condition, with a handkerchief, which had been soaked with the liquid, in one hand, and a six-ounce bottle of chloroform half-empty in the other.

The discovery was made late Saturday afternoon by David Waugh, a baker, who called at the house on his rounds. He immediately told others, who notified the authorities. Coroner Dr. Hoson of Innerkip and Crown Attorney Ball of this city investigated the affair, and deemed an inquest unnecessary, in view of the circumstances.

No motive has been established whatsoever. Miss McKie, the mother, was never married. The father of the murderer is said to have been a Russian military deserter. Little is known of him, however.

## THE CROP OUTLOOK
