Government Assists the University Board of Governors.

Toronto, Dec. 28.—An order-in-Council under the Act of last session has been passed vesting in the University Board of Governors the site of the old Parliament Buildings subject to a lease to the Grand Trunk Railway, and an option for purchase of such lease. The site was leased to the Grand Trunk on March 23, 1903, for 21 years, at a rental of \$6,000 for the first ten years, and \$7,000 for the other 11 years. If purchased within five years the company would pay \$185,000, or after that date \$200,000. The order-in-Council provides that after March 31st next, the rentals, if the purchase in the meantime is not made by the Grand Trunk Railway must be devoted to the new physics building at present under exection. 
