FARMERS ARRIVE AT THE MARKET ARMED WITH SNOW SHOVELS

Automobiles and Teams Show Signs of Battles With the Snowdrifts on Roads. SOME CAME PART OF THE WAY ON RUNNERS. Foto or More of Snow in Lot of Parishes—Temperature Drops to 13 To-day.

York county farmers arriving at the Phoenix Square market this morning from the outlying sections of the county which supply the city with farm produce came armed with snow shovels. The shovels were carried for the purpose of emergencies in navigating a safe passage for automobiles and farm vehicles through the snow drifts which exist throughout the county and which are reported to be a foot in depth in some sections as the result of Thursday's storm. Many of the automobiles and vehicles arrived in the market this morning crushed with snow and ice as the result of battles with drifts encountered in reaching the city. So severe were the winter-like conditions in the parishes of Dumfries, Bright and Stanley sections of the county that some parties arriving here made a portion of the trip on runners before reverting to wheels for the remainder of the trip into the city. In Canterbury, Southampton and other parishes there is a foot of snow in many places. The cold wave which swept over the continent on Thursday is reported throughout the United States as one of the worst October cold waves in history. Lowest temperatures were reported in the Dakotas, where icy winds from the Canadian Rockies dropped the mercury to 15 degrees below zero. One Nebraska city reported a temperature of 11 degrees below. The temperature here dropped to 13 above this morning, the lowest this fall.

LARGE MARKET TO-DAY.

Potatoes at \$3.50 to \$4—Eggs and Butter Not Very Plentiful in Market To-day. The market this morning was a large one with farm produce of every kind offered. Potatoes sold in large lots at \$3.50 and by the single barrel at \$4. Eggs and butter were not as plentiful as usual and brought 60 cents for the former and 45 cents for the latter. Apples were very plentiful and sold at \$1 to \$4 per barrel. Venison was offered freely at \$2 to \$2.50 per pound and chicken at 30 to 35 cents. Prevailing prices were as follows: Butter, per pound, 45 cents. Eggs, per dozen, 60 cents. Chickens, per pound, 30 to 35 cents. Pork, per pound, 25 cents. Venison, per pound, 8 to 12 cents. Beef, per pound, 6 to 8 cents. Lamb, per pound, 15 to 20 cents. Mutton, per pound, 8 to 12 cents. Pork, per pound, 16 to 20 cents. Potatoes, per barrel, \$3.50 to \$4. Apples, per barrel, \$1 to \$4. Parsnips, per barrel, \$3. Carrots, per barrel, \$2.50. Turnips, per barrel, \$1. Squash, per pound, 2 cents. Pumpkin, per pound, 2 cents.

NEW BRUNSWICK'S MOOSE TO BE TRIED IN NORTH DENMARK

Count Shimmelmarm Would Establish the Breed in His Own Forests. BELIEVES EXPERIMENT WOULD BE SUCCESSFUL. Would Be First Appearance of Moose in Europe South of Sweden.

Denmark will probably have an addition to its list of big game animals if Count Heinrich Carl Shimmelmarm, one of the largest landowners in Denmark, succeeds in his aim to transplant the North American moose to his native country where he hopes to acclimate the moose to Northern Denmark. Count Shimmelmarm, accompanied by Countess Louise Shimmelmarm, recently spent three weeks in the New Brunswick woods with Guide W. Harry Allen, president of the New Brunswick Guides Association, in the Cain's river district, where they travelled over three hundred miles on foot. They were unfortunate, however, in failing to spot anything but cow moose and on their departure were presented with a forty inch head by Mr. Allen. Smaller game fell prey to their guns, however. Count Shimmelmarm believes that in Northern Denmark about 300 miles above Esbjerg where he shares with Baron Juel, another Danish nobleman, a forest area of about 5,000 square miles, that on an area of 800 square miles now devoted to a herd of some 1,200 European elk wild boar and (Continued on Page Seven.)
