## Service in a Catacomb.

In that almost forgotten but still deeply interesting tale of ancient Rome, "Ysleus," written by John Gibson Lockhart, con-in-law and biographer of Sir Walter Scott, it is related of the hero that, being out at night on the Appian Way, he heard sounds strange and sweet apparently proceeding from under the earth beneath his feet. "The calm sepulchral music," he says, "still continued to stream from the recess of the mausoleum, and painless awe held me there as if by a charm uncontrollable." On her side she rests As one asleep; the delicate hands are crossed, Wrist upon wrist; a clinging vestment drapes The virgin limbs and round the slender throat A golden diadem masks her cruel wound, And there she lies for all to see.

A Latin inscription, not by Stefano Maderno, as here has been it in "Walks in Rome," but by Cardinal Paul Strondato, says, "Behold the image of the most holy virgin Cecilia, which I, Paul, of the title of St. Cecilia, saw lying thus in her tomb. I have desired that this marble should express for thee the posture which it was given to me to behold." It is not often that so exquisite and evidently accurate a work of art is produced for ten centuries after the person it represents has passed away from the world. Artists, indeed, rarely have such an opportunity

As he raised a mortal to the skies; She drew an angel down! And the same poet, after noting in his "Song of St. Cecilia's Day" the power of Orpheus, who "could lead the savage race," declares that "bright Cecilia raised the wretched higher; When to her organ vocal breath was given An Angel heard, and straight appeared— Mistaking Earth for Heaven!"

For those who take an interest in the marvellous history of early Christian Rome, or who are touched by the charming associations of Cecilia with music, to-day's visitation of the catacomb where her remains were placed after her martyrdom, is a memorable event. Many hundreds of strangers from far-away lands crowded these narrow passages, with the numberless empty graves on either hand, where the darkness was dispersed by the many lighted candles placed in wooden sconces at intervals along the walls. To-day's assembly might be considered as the first of the catacomb "season," which will be followed by several others until the end of April next. Such a "season" is not the same as that with which the bulk of travelers are most acquainted. That has its meetings at night, in halls of splendor and taste and brilliant illumination, while this characteristic "season" has its meetings in the day time, but under ground, amid the empty tombs of the dead, where faint glimmers of light from flickering tapers render legible the epitaph on a sepulchre or colors of a faded fresco on the wall above a grave.

Yet in such a gathering you may hear several languages spoken and note the types that distinguish the inhabitants of many widely separated lands. Here I met to-day with many people I knew: This family is from South Africa, from the land of gold and diamonds now so much spoken of; that lone gentleman is from New Zealand; these two Bishops, with their secretaries, are from Ireland; here is an English lady who has travelled from London night and day to reach Rome in time for this occasion; that dark-looking gentleman is the director of the excellent Roman Orchestra, and has, doubtless, come to honor to the patroness of music; this young priest with the kindly, intelligent countenance is from Baltimore; that thoughtful looking monk with the white robe and the far-away look in his eyes is a scholar and an exponent of the art of the catacombs who has just discovered in one of them a painting of marvellous interest, which has been

Motu Proprio of Leo XIII.  
The Rome correspondent of the Catholic Standard and Times, under date of the 8th ult., gives the following as the "Motu Proprio" of Leo XIII. regarding the Pontifical commission for the reconsecration of the dissident churches: From the period of the Apostolic letter "Præclara" we have strenuously endeavored to make a beginning and to put forward inducements dictated by charity for that most desirable union of faith among the people who have seceded from the Roman Mother Church at various times and for various causes. Indeed, we have put our hand to that enterprise which, as we have elsewhere stated, is a long and laborious undertaking, and the useful effects of which will not be speedily given effect to. But owing to a complete coincidence in the divine aid upon which we altogether rely, we have sought to create the best possible aids, and in the first place it has seemed well, considering the gravity and vastness of the cause, to take counsel from our beloved sons—the Cardinals of the Holy Roman Church. By our desire the meetings of these dignitaries were first directed to the consideration of the Eastern churches, and on this account it pleased us to convoke and consult our venerable brethren—the patriarchs of each rite and nation. This was so happily effected that certain decrees were resolved upon and published in a constitution; "Orientalium Dignitas Ecclesiarum"—decrees which, though they were primarily directed to the preservation and defense of the Eastern Catholics, manifestly tended to facilitate the return to unity of other peoples. But having regard to the first fruit of these meetings, and understanding that their continuance might be expected to be of great help to the other part of our undertaking, we were led to make provision that this method should be perpetuated and made fruitful by being systematic and enduring. Therefore, giving utterance to the intention in the present letter, we decree and rule that the council or commission, as it is called, should be separate and enduring, and that it should have for its proper function to further the reconsecration of the dissidents. It will consist of some Cardinals of the Holy Roman Church, whom the Pontiff will designate by name and whose president he will be, and who will hold regular meetings in his presence. The first whom we now appoint are: Michael Ledochowski, Benedict Mary Langenieux, Mariano Rampolla del Tindaro, Vincent Vanutelli, Aloisius Galimberti, Herbert Vaughan, Joseph Mary Granillo and Camillus Mazzella. There will also be, as is usual in the Sacred Congregation, a proper number of consultors to be likewise designated by the Pontiff, equal rank with whom will be possessed by those whom each of the Oriental Patriarchs shall appoint as their representatives in the city. The duty of the consultors will be to employ their learning, prudence and experience in the study of the cases dealt with by the Pontiff and the Cardinals mentioned above; but the submitting of the questions will be per-

formed by one of the consultors whom the Pontiff will designate as secretary, and who will have official to assist in the Pontifical deliberations. We wish and command the present constitution and decrees, the issue of which we place under the help of God, to be sanctioned and received by our authority. Given in Rome at St. Peter's, on the nineteenth day of March, 1895, in the eighteenth year of our pontificate. LEO XIII., Pope.

It is rumored says the N. Y. Freeman's Journal, that the next consistory will be held on the 28th or 29th of February, and as it is customary for new cardinals to be present at the next consistory after their elevation, it is probable that Cardinal Sattelli will take this opportunity. The same rumor says that Archbishop Grasselli will be his successor. An exchange says that Archbishop Grasselli is one of the most distinguished of the Roman hierarchy, and stands in the closest relations with the Pope. He is about 65 years old, and was for many years the Papal Nuncio at Constantinople. He is said to be thoroughly versed in State diplomacy, and carried through many important measures during his residence in the Turkish Empire. He has always manifested a deep interest in affairs in America, and speaks and writes the English language with ease. If he should be appointed to the vacancy caused by the retirement of Cardinal Sattelli, it is said that he will carry out the ideas of the latter with regard to the Catholic Church in the United States.

In Norway I have a notable illustration of the vitality of the Catholic Church. In no other part of Europe was Catholicity suppressed so successfully. Fifty years ago priests were still banished from the country under the pain of death. Catholics were liable to imprisonment, and the very name of the Church was in contempt. According to Bishop Fallize, however, the reaction in favor of Catholicity is as strong as the prejudice was violent. At the dedication of a Catholic church and hospital at Christiansand, recently, thousands of Protestants, including the chief officials of the province, were present. At the close of the ceremony a prominent official made, in which he prayed for Christian unity and the decay of religious hate. Bishop Fallize modestly attributes this remarkable change of popular sentiment to the influence of the nun, who travel in their religious garb, and are in constant demand as nurses in Protestant homes. So highly are they esteemed that they are allowed free passage in street cars and on many of the steamship lines. American Catholic News.
