## The Sunday Express.

### Why is the Govt. Supporting It?

On Sunday last, a newspaper appeared for the first time. It is called the Sunday Express. Its Editor and Proprietor is Mr. W. M. Dooley, who lately edited the Western Star in the interest of the Morris Government. It is printed and published at 231 Theatre Hill at the "Plainsdealer" office. According to its own avowal, "the Sunday Express has no politics." But strangely the chief advertising patron of the Sunday Express is the Government. On page 6 there are two Notices to Mariners, taking up three quarters of a column, signed by A. W. Piccott, Minister of Marine & Fisheries. But these two ads. are not the only ones Mr. Dooley received from the Department of Marine and Fisheries, for on page 7, there is a column ad. from the Game and Inland Fisheries Board, signed Jas. W. Mercer, Secretary. Turning back to page 6 we find a double column ad., a quarter of a column long, from the Department of Public Works, signed James Harris, Secretary. On page 8 there are also two Government ads., which take up four fifths of two columns. The larger ad. is signed S. D. Blandford, Minister of Agriculture and Mines; the smaller one is signed Alex. A. Parsons, Superintendent Newfoundland Penitentiary.

We have already pointed out that the editor declares the Sunday Express has no politics. But curiously this statement introduces a write-up booming Mr. J. F. Downey, the Tory

member for St. George's, and is followed by a paragraph eulogizing Mr. Maurice Devine's so called joke about "the peculiar vernacular of Branch and Bay Roberts," a bit of taffy for the Hon. P. T. McGrath, and an announcement of the Morris candidates for St. John's East. Yet the editor declares the Sunday Express has no politics. Why then is the Morris Government its chief advertising patron? If it is not for its politics, is it because it is a Sunday Newspaper?

### Marine Notes.

The Nellie M. left Barbados to-day molasses laden for P. E. I. and will bring a cargo of produce here. The S. S. Euphrates arrived here to-day and will take a full freight to Conception Bay ports to-morrow. The Fogata sailed north at 10 a.m. to-day with a full freight. Her passengers were: Mrs. M. Quinn, W. J. Walsh, Miss F. Noel, Capt. S. R. Windsor, and several steers. The Waterwitch, Capt. Moore left Sydney yesterday with 300 tons coal for Crosbie & Co. The Bargin, Minnie sails for Brazil to-morrow, fish laden by Goodridge & Sons. The S. S. Portia left Gaultois at 5 a.m. to-day. The S. S. Prospero sails northward to-morrow morning.

### Cable News.

#### Special Evening Telegram.

SYDNEY, To-Day. The Morwenna arrived this morning from Montreal and sighted the new Montreal floating dock 120 miles off Sydney.

PODGORITZA, To-Day. The Turkish town, Tushli, surrendered to the Montenegrins yesterday. This opens the way to Scutari, where the Turkish forces are said to be concentrating, and on which the Montenegrin troops are now advancing. The division commanded by Crown Prince Danilo, after a fierce battle occupied the fortifications on the heights of Ushanitch, Tushli, Paltai. The final charge against Tushli and Paltai was at the bayonet point, and the Turk surrendered. Five hundred prisoners were taken.

VALPARAISO, To-Day. Three new islands, without vegetation, supposed to be the result of a recent marine upheaval, were discovered sixty miles southwest of Juan Fernandez by the captain of the steamship Glenalvon, who reported them on the arrival of the steamer here.

LONDON, To-Day. As crowds pass the British Embassy in Constantinople the wild cheering shows a feeling very different to that in Germany, where there is a campaign of almost unprecedented ferocity and irresponsibility. The formal war parties declare Britain is engaged in a diabolical attempt to foment a European conflagration in which Germany would fall an easy prey to Anglo-French domination. The London Times to-day rebukes Lloyd George in its most dignified fashion for saying on Saturday, "If war ensued he hoped the result would be that the bounds of freedom in Government would be extended." "This," says the Times, "will certainly be quoted abroad as an ill-concealed example of taking sides. The truth is that all the efforts of Sir Edward Grey are directed towards damping down the fires of strife, and where they prove inevitable, of confining them within the narrowest limits, but he and all Englishmen know the real danger will come when battles are lost or won and when Russia, Austria, Germany and Italy, each with its own conflicting ambition, see the victors proceeding to enjoy hard earned spoils.

### Did Good Work.

The past summer a man named Jno. Haloney, of Stock Cove, could not get supplies to go to the Labrador fishery, and for a while despaired of making a summer's wages. However, he soon pulled himself together, and taking his two boys with him (aged 15 and 17 years) he put his trap out off Stock Cove and succeeded in returning 600 qts. Ordinarily his crew would have been five hands, and his enterprise and industry were deservedly rewarded.

In days gone by this kind of a game might work but now things are changed and the common people like Shannahan and Tucker feel that the same kind of treatment should be given to the Rich as well as the Poor.

Now, for the past week or so stories have been going the rounds of the city that a well-to-do woman treated a little dog so unmercifully as to cause its death, and if this be true, Tucker would like to know why we haven't heard of punishment being meted out. On the other hand, if the story is false, we should be made wise on the matter, and the woman whose reputation is at stake should be freed from the blame in which she is held.

The morning News told us that the case was to come before the Court, but though Tucker has scanned all the papers, he has failed to find out anything about the proceedings, if there were any proceedings.

Tucker and Shannahan have talked out freely about cruelty to animals and they are glad that a man has been appointed to attend to these matters, but if we get the idea abroad that the poor carman who ill-treats a horse must suffer and Mrs. Highsociety who injures a dog is allowed to go scot free, then we will introduce class justice in this town which will have but one result and that is want of confidence in the manner that such justice is carried out.

Everybody to-day seems to be inclined to see the dumb animals get a square show for their lives, and whilst we rejoice in the fact that a step is being made to renew the life of the Cruelty to Animals Society, still we pause for a moment and ask ourselves is the movement going to be ridiculed by hushing up a case of cruelty because the perpetrator happened to belong to the class known as the Upper Ten. As we said before, if the woman in question didn't kill the dog, then by all means make it public, but if she did kill the dog then let all means be used to bring justice, though the pride of that woman and all her associates fall to forty feet below zero.
