National Thanksgiving.

Thanksgiving is defined as a public acknowledgment or celebration of Divine goodness: a day set apart for religious services, specially to acknowledge the goodness of God, either in any remarkable deliverance from calamities or danger, or in the ordinary dispensation of His bounties. There are many exhortations to thanksgiving in both the Old and New Testaments. Sacred and profane history contain references to numerous instances of thanksgiving, both personal and national. In fact it has been recognized from time immemorial that special services of thanksgiving are the proper form of rendering gratitude to Deity for manifold mercies, deliverance from enemies, salvation from pestilence, bountiful harvests and national prosperity.

Thanksgiving Day in the United States of America has been an annual festival from the landing of the Pilgrim Fathers on the bleak New England shores in the early years of the 17th century. Practically it is a national harvest festival, fixed by proclamation, and ranks as a legal holiday. In the year 1789 the Episcopal Church of America formally recognised the right of the authority of the civil government to appoint such a feast, and to honor a festival which had long been almost universally observed—though nowhere with more zest than in the New England States where it ranks as the great annual family festival, taking the same place accorded to Christmas in England. Since 1863, proclamations issued by the Presidents have appointed the last Thursday in November as Thanksgiving Day, duly observed throughout the Union.

It is fitting that nations as well as individuals should offer up praises of Thanksgiving to the Almighty for mercies vouchsafed them. Causes for gratitude are multitudinous, and humanity on its knees in humble yet hearty thanks to God is a spectacle to put more life, more power, more strength into Christianity and to influence its leaders to more earnest labors in the cause for which they so ceaselessly toil. In common with other countries Newfoundland has her annual day of Thanksgiving, duly observed throughout the Union.

Police Court.

Starting a Drug Business!—Two men and a woman were charged with the larceny of a quantity of drugs to the value of \$10 from the store of M. Connors, the men pleaded guilty, the girl not guilty.
Evidence was given by Constables Bruce and Pitcher to the effect that they had heard sounds coming from the drugstore whilst they were on night duty, and they had seen the accused taking some of the articles. Sergeant Fitzgerald said that he effected the arrest of the watchman, one of the prisoners.

Michael Walsh, called, said the watchman had asked the girl to go and have a drink of rum and she refused to go without witness.
Judging by the articles which were stolen the accused must have had the intention of opening a drug business. Among these articles were Tannin, Liniment, Gluten Capsules, Strichaine Sulphate, Soothing Syrup, Nerve Food and Blue Ointment.

Scotch Haggis.

Procure a sheep's pluck and stomach bag. After carefully washing the pluck, place it in a potful of water to boil. The windpipe should hang out of the pot, in order that any impurities generated may have means of egress. The pluck is boiled for two hours. It is a good thing to ask the butcher to clean the stomach bag, but in addition to that, it is necessary to further clean it by bringing it to a boil. This has the effect of contracting the bag. The next thing to do is to put the bag on with cold water, and after it has again been brought to the boil, the water is poured off, the bag is scraped thoroughly, and is then left in cold water until required.

The next process is to mince the best part of the heart and lungs, leaving out fatty and gristly pieces. The liver is next grated, and all these are put into a large basin. Next, moisten with oatmeal, and chop finely 1 lb. of good beef suet, also a large onion. Add these ingredients to the contents in the basin, also a dessertspoonful of salt and a tablespoonful of pepper. Moisten all with a breakfastcupful of liquid, in which the pluck has been boiled.
At this stage the stomach bag is filled with the mass, but the filling should be made for the contents swelling, otherwise the haggis will burst. The opening is then closed up, and the haggis is put in a potful of boiling water, and boiled gently for three hours. To prevent the haggis from bursting, it should be pricked several times during boiling with a darning needle. In order that the haggis may be taken to the bottom of the pot, it is necessary to put a plate or old saucer underneath it.—Glasgow Paper.

United Thanksgiving Service.

The non-sectarian churches of the city, Congregational, Presbyterian and Methodist, held a united service in St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church on Thanksgiving Day. So large a congregation was present despite the inclemency of the weather, that it looked as if had the day been fine there might not have been room in the church for the people. It was a refreshing evidence of the fraternity and unity which exists among the free churches of the city, that they should thus hold their Thanksgiving Service together, and most seek to hallow the day set apart by royal proclamation for colony-wide Thanksgiving by devoting one hour of the twelve to public acknowledgment in His house and through His worship of the goodness and mercy of Almighty God. Why could we not have a wider union, and a more general participation in devout recognition of blessings which come without distinction to all?

The service was a delightful one. The church was bright and warm, the choir large, and most hearty in leading the singing, and the preacher of the occasion, the Rev. Frank Baird, B.A., who has won golden opinions during his brief stay in the city, delivered a most appropriate and helpful sermon. Taking as his text 1 Samuel: 4:5, the bringing of the Ark of God into the camp of the Israelites, to their great joy and encouragement, and to the dismay and discomfiture of their Philistine enemies, because as they said "God is come into the camp," the preacher remarked that the spiritual blessings of God even more than the material ones, should evoke our highest thanksgiving. God was coming in these days closer to His Church, to the great joy and encouragement of His people, and to the manifest discouragement of the forces of evil. The latter were not afraid of creeds or of churches, but they were afraid of God. In the second place, the coming of the church and its worship in the great symbols of His grace and power, in the increased activity and sympathy displayed in the attitude towards sinning and suffering humanity: in the growing spirit of unity, of which the present service was an apt expression, and in the united voice of the Bishops at the recent Lambeth Conference an indication and in general, in the deeper devotion and wider horizon of those who were called by His name.

The Church is defective in many respects, it is true, but her excellent and noble outnumbers her defects. And the more sure she is of the presence and power of God in her midst the greater will be her tenderness and the more perfect her sympathy. It was this great spiritual blessing, said the preacher, for which we thank most to thank God. "A man's life consisteth not in the abundance of the things which he possesseth." That is being uncomfortably, perhaps even painfully, and dismayingly made known to us to-day, in reduced profits, depressed stocks, and financial stringency. But things material are not the great values. The great values are spiritual. A man's life is not material but spiritual. What we need is to set up the Ark of God. Set up the Ark of God in the counting-house, in the parlour, in the busy streets. Set up not the Methodist Ark or the Anglican Ark, or the Roman Catholic Ark, or the Presbyterian Ark, or the Congregational Ark, but set up the Ark of God.

Distinguished Newfoundlander.
We learn that Rev. Dr. P. W. Browne, a native of Carboneau, has been nominated to a Fellowship in History at the Catholic University of America, and will lecture on "The Beginning of American Ecclesiastical History." In addition he takes up the managing editorship of the Catholic Historical Review, the most important Catholic publication of its kind in the United States. The Academic distinction attained by Dr. Browne is without doubt the highest ever received by any of Terra Nova's sons. His native land, and particularly Carboneau, may well feel proud of their distinguished son. Congratulations.

Ice Hockey.

OXFORD AND CAMBRIDGE MATCH IN SWITZERLAND.
The Ice Hockey match between Oxford and Cambridge took place at Murran on Dec. 30, last, says a Reuter dispatch to the London Times, in brilliant sunshine and on rather soft ice. The result was a drawn game; neither side was able to score. This was the first university match played since the war.

At the end of the three periods of ten minutes each, the captains agreed to play two extra periods of five minutes, but still the sides were unable to score. Cambridge pressed heavily throughout the game, but the ice was rather sticky and this helped to make the shooting erratic. The chief feature of the match was the brilliant defence of the Oxford goal by K. Taylor, the

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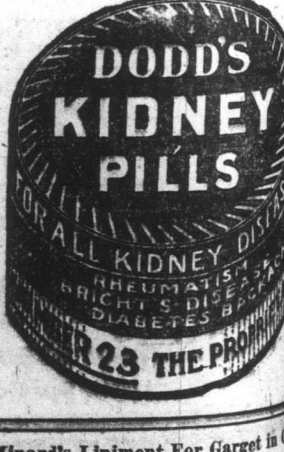
