TO-DAY'S MESSAGES.

BLOODSHED IN MONTREAL.
MONTREAL, May 3.
Two constables were shot, probably fatally, and several others wounded in a clash between striking Longshoremen and policemen last night.

CHINESE BATTLE.
PEKING, May 3.
Heavy fighting has been in progress yesterday between 40,000 troops of General Pei-pu and the arm. of General Tso-li, who is sending the main body of his 100,000 soldiers to the front, south of the Great Wall.

DISCUSSING CURRENCY REFORMS.
GENOA, May 3.
The second plenary session of the Genoa Economic Conference opened at ten o'clock this morning. Sir Laming Worthington Evans presented the Financial Commissions report, which is termed as important to the world as was the Justini Code. Stabilizing the purchase of gold, without American co-operation, he said. The Financial report contains nineteen resolutions, among which is a recommendation that the Bank of England call a meeting of central banks of issue, to regulate a credit policy and to study currency reforms. The resolutions urge an International Financial Convention, to centralize and coordinate demand for gold, which would be adopted as a standard for European currency.

HIS DIARY.

I did also meet there Mr. and Mrs. Cheshire, that have been abroad these many months and did but lately return. Diverse cabaret items did interest me greatly, and most of all, the dancing of Miss Rendell. My wife, jealous of me, nor would she allow me to leave her side, for which I shall have much to say to her to-morrow. Many did walk on my foot while I danced, and hurt it so, that needs must I engage a coach to drive me home, and it more almost, than I could afford. So to bed, mighty weary.

Trains and Steamers.

EXPRESS DUE FRIDAY.
The express which left Port aux Basques yesterday with a large mail, and the passengers who arrived on S. S. Kyle, is due in the city early Friday morning. The express was delayed by the drifts which covered the Top-sails section of the line, as a result of the recent snow storm. A local express is also on its way. The line is now clear of snow.

LEFT ARGENTINA.
S.S. "Glencoe" left Argentina at 10:45 last night on the South West Coast service.

CONTRABAND WAREHOUSE.
S.S. Daisy, which made a seizure on the schooner Little B, arrived in port last night with the contraband cargo on board. To-day a number of horses were engaged hauling the wet goods to the Customs Warehouse. The master of the schooner is very ill, and had to be landed at his home port in Cape Broyle yesterday.

The Daily Questionnaire.

WEDNESDAY, May 3.
1. Sir M. P. Cashin—To ask the Prime Minister if the Government Engineer has made, during 1921, the tour of inspection of the Railroad, provided under the Railway contract, and if so, to lay on the Table of the House copy of the same, and if not, to say why such tour of inspection was not made; also to furnish a special report from the Government Engineer showing what improvements, if any, were made in the railroad track, bridges, etc., during the first year of 1919-20 by the Railway Company, during the fiscal year 1921 by the Railway Commission, and for ten months of the current fiscal year; whatever body is operating the railroad and a detailed statement of the nature and cost of the various improvements for each of these periods.
2. Sir M. P. Cashin—To ask the Prime Minister to lay on the Table of the House a statement signed by the Government Engineer giving an estimate of the additional Revenue received by the Railway Company during the current fiscal year through the increase of one cent per mile of first class passenger rates put into effect when the Railroad Commission assumed the control of the Railroad two years ago.
3. Sir M. P. Cashin—To ask the Prime Minister, to lay on the Table of the House a statement signed by the Government Engineer, showing the progress made to April 30th of this year on the completion of the one hundred freight cars provided for the Railroad under the legislation of 1920 setting out:—
(a) The number of cars actually completed and ready for use.
(b) The stages of the completion of the remainder.
(c) The dates on which any or all will likely be delivered as ready for use; and
(d) The number begun and also the number completed from July 1, 1921, to date.
4. Sir M. P. Cashin—To ask the Hon. Prime Minister, why it is that no progress has been made with the building of the new freight sheds in St. John's authorized under the Loan Bill of two years ago, and the early erection of which was promised at that time, and why does not the Government proceed at present with this public work the necessity of which was then claimed to be very great, seeing that just now there is widespread distress among the working people of this city as a result of unemployment and the starting of this work would do much to lessen the extent of such unemployment.
5. Sir M. P. Cashin—To ask the Hon. Prime Minister, what steps, if any, he had undertaken to make good the promise made to the Legislature at the session, two years ago, that he would, during the visit to England which he was then planning, secure the services of a competent lawyer skilled in railway problems, and bring him out here to investigate and report upon our railway contracts and our relations with the Reid Newfoundland Company, and if he has not taken that step, why not?
6. Mr. Walsh—To ask Hon. the Prime Minister, in the absence of Hon. the Minister of Marine and Fisheries, to lay on the Table of the House a copy of Government Regulations under which Spring Herring are now being packed, if no regulations are in force, to state to the House, whether or not the Herring Fishery is abandoned by the Government.
