

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Mines That

Produce Soap.

Soap mines exist in several districts in North America. There is one in Nevada, on the line of the Central Pacific Railroad. This natural soap, which lathers with ease, is embedded as compactly as new clay, and the soap mine is of considerable extent. A soap mine exists at Ashcroft, in British Columbia, forming the bottom and sides of a lake which contains water strongly impregnated with borax of soda. These having solidified, the substance can be sawn out in oks as if it were ice.
