lind Your Accumulator When and Where to Got it Charged— And Other Good Hints.

If you have a wireless net with arefully. These tips will help you: The local electric power station is andoubtedly the best place at which to charge your batteries, providing that

Never let the voltage of a cell drop too low. If you have a voltmeter, use it on the accumulator now and again. and don't let the voltage fall below 1.8 per cell. If you have no voltmeter take the accumulator to be recharged begins to lose its brilliance.

If the voltage drops too low, what is known as "sulphating" will set in. Sulphating is the forming of a hard white crust of lead sulphate upon the plates, and is disastrous to the health of the cell. If you suspect your battery of sulphating, take it to your charging man at once.

The plates of a cell rest on bars, which keep them high enough to allow ufficient space for the sediment which ops from the plates during usage. Cells must be examined periodically and this sediment removed, otherwise it will, in time, become high enough to short-circuit the plates, with byious results.

Never let an accumulator stand idle any length of time. When a battery is not in use, it should have a short charge twice a month to keep it in good condition and to counteract sulphating: the golden rule is, "The more charging the better."
