Scrap of Cord May Lead Thug to Death Chair

HENRY LESSER, WHO ROBBED COMPOSER'S WIFE, MAY BE MURDERER.

NEW YORK, May 15—A similarity between some bits of cord may send Harry Lesser to the electric chair.

The smooth, young thug, whose face warped and crooked as his soul, but whose outward manner has the Broadway polish, used cord to strangle some of his victims. Other times, they were merely bound.

When he slipped a noose about the jewel-laden throat of Mrs. Howard Johnson, wife of the composer, and stripped her of her gems, he made the inevitable mistake and overlooked something. By such a little thing as an empty medicine bottle, neglected on a bathroom shelf, Lesser was traced and caught within 24 hours after his victim was found, half strangled, the familiar cord heavily buried in the white flesh of her neck.

In such a way Louise Lawson died. The little Texas musician whose short, mad whirl on Broadway is still a by-word, was strangled to death by one of two men who stole the jewels from her up-town apartment not far from the hotel in which Mrs. Johnson was robbed.

Belief exists that this man of half a dozen aliases may indeed be leader of a gang of jewel robbers, whose methods of putting their women victims beyond speech (often quite carelessly beyond life) revert to the strangulation by cord practiced by the thugs of India.

Already the police have found that the cord which nearly cost Mrs. Johnson her life was similar to that which bound the hands and feet of Herbert Bartlett, a silk merchant, robbed by a gang three weeks ago, and to that used in a robbery of the apartment of Mrs. Milred Ford, who has identified Lesser as her assailant.

Lesser played the game in a big way when he sought after the Johnson jewels. First he obtained the assistance of a young woman. Through a mutual acquaintance this girl was introduced to Mrs. Johnson, and in turn introduced her husband—Lesser.

For the purpose of robbing Mrs. Johnson, the couple had taken a suite at the newest Broadway hotel. The girl forced her friendship on the unsuspecting wife of the co-author of "Tangerine" and other musical shows until it had reached a stage where Mrs. Johnson was invited to ride in their automobile.

An expensive Pierce Arrow car with liveried chauffeur appeared evidence of the couple's affluence. Lesser used an English accent and suave manner to good effect.

Then came the invitation to a late breakfast in the couple's suite Monday, a party which lengthened as the evening wore on, and ended in Mrs. Johnsons being nearly strangled to death.

If the cord used on Mrs. Johnson proves like that which choked off Louise Lawson's life, Lesser may be convicted of that crime. The police also hope to connect the man with the more remote murder of "Dot" King, beautiful model. But they admit this is far fetched.

As for the Louise Lawson case, however, they are not at all sure that they haven't got their man. The elevator boy who took up the murderer of the Texas girl up to her apartment had a long look at Lesser in the line-up yesterday.

"He don't blink so much as the man I took up," the elevator boy said, dubiously. "And the other feller had on tortoise shell glasses." Harry Lesser admits he was arrested by New York detectives in Montreal while on his wedding tour.

While the police still were at work last night trying to connect Lesser with other jewel robberies of recent date, Samuel Schastain and his wife Celia were held up on the darkened porch of their Brooklyn home and robbed of \$400, in cash and jewelry valued at \$10,000.

Lesser is variously known to the police under the aliases of Harry Lesser, Beham, Wilson, Phillips, Prent and Roth. He is alleged to have confessed he stole the stones to "get enough to pay my mouthpiece in Washington"—to pay a lawyer at Washington, D.C. where he was recently arrested for burglary and released on bail. The records indicate he was born in Dorchester, Eng., and that he has served in Sing Sing prison at least a penitentiary and Trenton prison in this country.

Companions Die of Same Disease Within Few Short Hours

Lucan, Ont., May 15—Neighbors and companions for several years, Patrick Doyle and Wm. Fraser, who lived near Mooreville, dropped dead within a few hours, and of the same disease, carditis.

Friday while preparing to retire, Fraser fell dead, yesterday morning, while lighting the gas to prepare breakfast, Doyle followed his companion across the great divide. Doyle was 51 years old and Fraser 55.
