

ONE of the great trio of Scottish Free Church preachers has recently died. Dr. A. D. Davidson, of Aberdeen, was a man of scholarly tastes, rich culture, exceeding genial temperament, and withal of such a singularly retiring disposition, that he persistently refused to be elevated to the highest honours within the gift of the Free Church. When Dr. Davidson was elected to be the successor in the new College, Edinburgh, Free St. George's congregation were most anxious to secure the pastorate of Dr. Davidson, but he would not consent to it, and never left Aberdeen where he died of an asthmatic attack of great severity, in the fortieth year of his ministry and aged 67, deeply and universally lamented. Of the remaining two referred to, Candlish is now quite incapacitated, physically, from work, and Guthrie is out of harness, each having literally worn themselves out in the various schemes of the ecclesiastical body they have loved and served so well.
