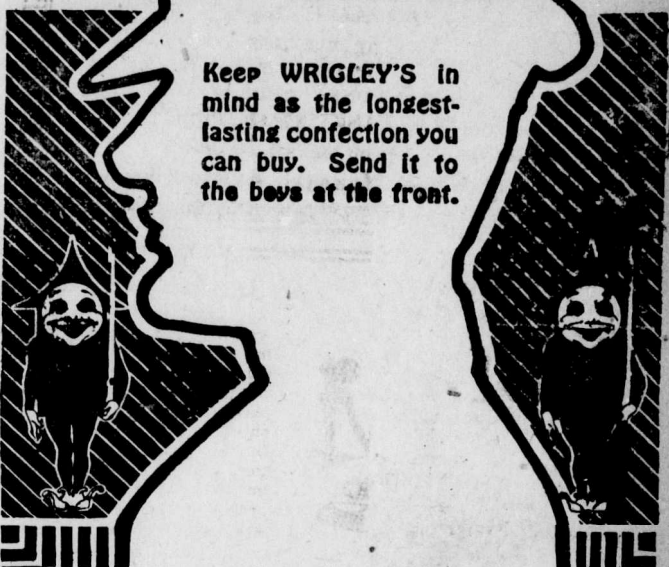

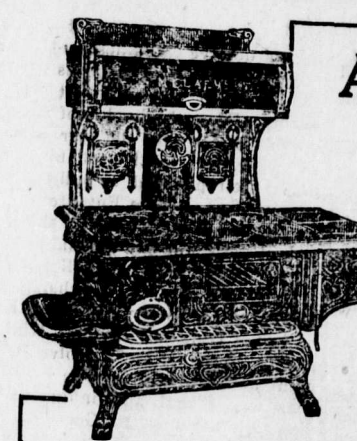

An inquest touching the death of T. Nichol, who was killed at the Strathroy canning factory a week ago, was held on Wednesday of last week. Mr. Nichol was a brother-in-law of Mrs. Edgerton Matthews, of Aylmer.

The jury found that Mr. Nichol met his death by being crushed with the floor collapsing from an overload in the north-west corner of the building. They also recommended the floor of this building be made much stronger, if to be used in future for storing goods, and that factory inspection should be much more rigid regarding floors of buildings.
