IN A DRENCHING RAINFALL.

3,000 Umbrella-People Stood and Welcomed Soldiers.

An Address Presented to the Returning Heroes, to Which Color-Sergt. Eustace Replied in a Modest Speech—Sir Charles Tupper Spoke For Twenty Minutes and Uttered Many Complimentary Words—Hoer War a Just One.

Halifax, N.S., Aug. 29.—In a drenching rainfall, fully 3,000 persons stood out under umbrellas, in the lawn of Halifax's magnificent public gardens, last night and listened to an address by the veteran leader, Sir Charles Tupper, at the concert given in honor of the return of a portion of the Halifax company of the first contingent and to raise funds to erect a memorial to those who have fallen in South Africa.

Eloquent in Its Simplicity.

An address was presented to the returned heroes and to Sir Charles. Color-Sergt. Eustace of H Company responded in a speech which was most eloquent in its simplicity. "No one in the whole crowd," he said, "feels more proud to-night than I and my brothers who were with us in South Africa. We only wish they were all home. We will have some others home in about 10 weeks. We left some there, and some who will never return. They were killed along-side of us. The people cannot know what it feels like to have a man fall alongside of you, after having become so bound together like brothers.

Sir Charles' Speech.

Sir Charles Tupper spoke for about 20 minutes, and then excused the people from attending the reception, which he was to have held. Sir Charles heartily endorsed the proposal to erect a monument to those who had fallen, and said that he regarded the volunteering of young Canadians to fight side by side with the British army in South Africa as having done more towards the glory of the Empire than any other action that could have been undertaken or completed.

Dr. Larocque and a Companion Were Chased and Fired At.

Quebec, Aug. 29.—Dr. G. Larocque, Sergeant-at-Arms of the Legislative Assembly, had been visiting the site of the future Quebec bridge at La Chaudiere, Sunday last, in company with Rev. E. Valiquet of the Seminary of Ste. Therese, when, on their return home, through the woods, two miles from St. Romauld, they were summoned to stop by a group of brigands, hiding there. Dr. Larocque fortunately succeeded with his companion in escaping, and distanced the assailants, but they were for nearly a mile their target, and were fired at many times. The provincial police has been charged to make search in the woods surrounding Chaudiere Falls.

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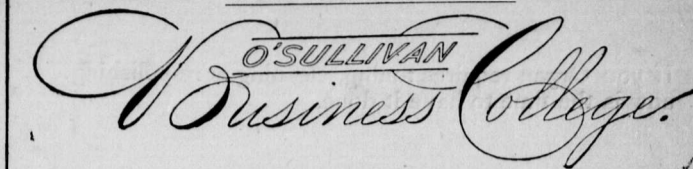

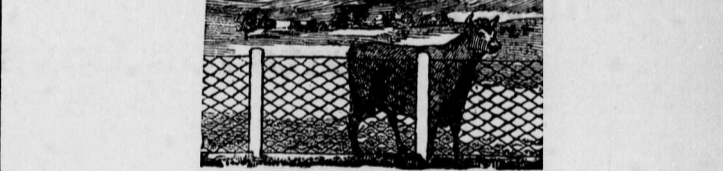
