Toronto, Feb. 26.—11 p.m.—The pressure is comparatively low along the Nova Scotia coast and in the Northwest Territories, and higher over the Middle States. Light local snowfalls have occurred in the Maritime Provinces; elsewhere the weather has been fine.

Minimum and maximum temperatures: Calgary, 38°—50°; Qu'Appelle, 28°—38°; Winnipeg, 24°—42°; Parry Sound, 4 below—22°; Toronto, 10°—30°; Montreal, 4°—16°; Quebec, 6°—16°; Halifax, 26°—35°.

—Bishop Baldwin preached in Trinity Church Sunday morning and evening with all his old-time vigor. His friends and those who had heard of his eloquence flocked to hear him, and they were certainly far from being disappointed. [Montreal Witness.]

—Appel and Anderson (singer), evangelists from the Moody Institute, Chicago, will tonight open a series of meetings at St. James' Presbyterian Church, Richmond street. By a mistake it was announced that these meetings would begin last evening, and as a result a number of persons flocked to the church.

—At Mr. Szaizelle's matinee performance on Saturday he will give by special desire "The Whistler." At the matinee on Saturday he will also show a magnificent scenic effect entitled "Angels Ever Bright and Fair," which scene is the best ever seen of the "Rock of Ages." shall be willing in the day of thy power," exemplified by the willingness with which the people responded in bringing free gifts to the Tabernacle. "The children of Israel brought a willing offering unto the Lord, every man and woman whose heart made them willing for all manner of work which the Lord had commanded to be made by the hand of Moses," till the people brought much more than enough of their gold and silver, brass, precious stones, and purple and fine linen. "So the people were restrained from bringing." Mrs. (Rev.) Smith was elected a member of the executive committee representing the Talbot Street Baptist Church. The annual meeting of the Canadian Red Cross was announced to be held in Hamilton on the 7th day of March. Miss Hamilton (treasurer) was elected to represent the London branch as a delegate. Upon receipt of a card from the secretary of the National Council of Women of Canada re the prayer question, it was moved by Mrs. Evans, seconded by Mrs. Clark, that the clause be not withdrawn and that the council be opened by audible prayer. An amendment moved by Mrs. Boomer, that the council be opened by silent prayer followed audibly by the Lord's Prayer. Carried. And the delegates were so instructed to vote upon that question. A solo by Miss Daly and letters read by Mrs. Jas. Bowman and Mrs. Tennant closed the day's exercises. The meeting adjourned till the first Monday in May unless sooner convened for important business.

Death of W. H. Meredith.
A Montreal dispatch says: Mr. W. H. Meredith, a prominent broker of this city, and director of the Bank of Montreal, died this (Tuesday) afternoon from pneumonia. Mr. Meredith was a son of the late Sir William Collier Meredith, chief justice of the Queen's Bench, Quebec, and second cousin to Chief Justice Meredith, of Toronto, and of Mr. H. W. Meredith, local manager of the Bank of Montreal.

Important Decision.
In a case tried before Chancellor Boyd last year his Lordship decided that in a case where a tenant assigns the landlord is entitled to his rent and also to the fixtures, said fixtures being held to be gas fixtures, shelving, mirrors, window fixtures, outside awnings and other articles, brought on the demised premises as independent personal chattels, and physically attached by nails or screws, but not corporeally appurtenant for the purpose of keeping them in place. Judgment has been given on appeal reversing this decision.

Fell Down the Stairs.
Mrs. Ferguson Manning, of 308 Queen's avenue, attended the performance at the Grand Opera House last night. She came out by the Richmond street exit, and in descending the stairway lost her footing and fell more than halfway to the bottom. Besides a severe shaking up Mrs. Manning received painful cuts on the head. The fall was rare, but not so serious as it might have been, where her injuries were attended to, and she was removed to her home.

Manager Holman's Benefit.
Mr. Alfred D. Holman, the efficient manager of the Queen's Avenue rink, was tendered a complimentary benefit last night. That Mr. Holman is popular among the lovers of the winter pastime need hardly be stated, and as a mark of their appreciation of his efforts in their behalf, about 800 young people attended the benefit. The ice was as good as could be expected, considering the high temperature, and a good time was spent. The Seventh Band, which was present by permission of Lieut.-Col. Lindsay and officers, furnishing enlivening music. As a special attraction a three-mile race was put on between Don Kennedy, of Hamilton, and Charles Griffiths, of this city. Griffiths did not have any trouble in winning by three laps in 9½ minutes. Mr. Thomas Gillan acted as judge and Mr. Holman as time-keeper.

Through Southern Africa.
Mr. J. H. Aiken repeated his lecture on "Life in Southern Africa" to a large and highly critical audience in the Grand Opera House last evening. Mr. Aiken has traveled widely through Africa, and delivers a very instructive lecture. His talk is illustrated by numerous fine views from nature, which give an excellent idea of the country and tends to interest the hearer. It takes about two hours to hear and see a great part of what it took Mr. Aiken ten years to go through, and there is also the advantage of having no hardships to contend against. The views are some of the finest ever seen in this city. The proceeds are in aid of the Dundas Street Center Church, and the church members and their friends turned out well to aid in so excellent a cause. Mr. Aiken's lecture on Southern Africa is bound to become popular.
