FLAVORING EXTRACTS And Will Probably Recommend the City Council to Purchase the Place-Want Assistance From the County.

> The idea of purchasing the grounds and buildings of Hellmuth Ladies' College and turning the same into a new City Hospital has been resuscitated and now promises to come to a head. The Star Insurance Company, of Montr eal which helds a mortgage on the college property, have placed the premises in the hands of A. A. Campbell, and overtures have been in progress for some time between the trustees and Mr. Campbell. On Satur. day the members of the Hospital Trust including Messrs. Lewis, Complin and Gilmour, accompanied by County Engineer Talbot and Fred Henry, of Moore & Henry, visited the college on a tour of inspection. The price asked for the place is \$25,000. It is thought that if the change is made from the present site to the proposed one the apathy exhibited by the county council will disappear. As it is at present the county will have nothing to do with enlarging the

present institution. "Middlesex is a rich county and should do something towards a new hospital," said a man well versed in hospital affairs today. It is thought that the scheme will be favorably received by the county authorities. The matter of the proposed altera-tions on the old hospital, which would cost \$15,000 or \$16,000, will be held in abeyance until the report of Mr. Henry on the col-lege building is received. This money would go far towards purchasing the magnificent property. The college structure is far more suitable for hospital purposes than the present one. Situated on a fine bluff overlooking the river its position is eminently healthful. It is also away from the noise and turmoil of city life, and an electric line would make it quite accessible. The Hospital Trust will consider the matter at its next meeting and probably recommend the purchase to the council. So far as heard, the idea is favorably entertained by the public.

DIABOLICAL ATTEMPT

To Roast a 400 Pound Man-It Nearly

WICHITA, Kan., March 25.-An attempt was made yesterday to burn alive Fritz Schneitzler, one of the wealthiest men in this city, and for many years in charge of the German immigrant bureau of the Santa Fe Railway. 
