London, Wednesday, July 13.

The New York Recorder warmly praises Hon. Edward Blake's recent addresses in Ireland. "Ten such clear-headed talkers in England," it adds, "would have won many more constituencies for the Liberals."

THOS. B. FLINT, M.P., the well-known temperance advocate, has been confirmed in his seat at Yarmouth, N.S. His opponents confessed they had no evidence against him. Mr. Flint is a Liberal.

The rumor is revived that the C. P. R. has about completed arrangements to extend its line from Woodstock to Suspension Bridge, where direct connection with New York City will be obtained. A new bridge over Niagara will be begun at once.

HON. WILFRED LAURIER did not miss a sitting of the session of Parliament just closed. He had able aid from Hon. David Mills, who gave powerful assistance to his leader in exposing and combating wrongdoing and in improving the legislation brought before the House.

That was a noble peroration which Gladstone uttered in his first speech to the electors of Midlothian. "Let us go forward," he said, "in the good work we have in hand, and let us put our trust, not in squire and peers (cheers), and not in titles or in acres; I will go further and say, not in man, as such, but in Almighty God, who is the God of justice, and who has ordained the principle of right, of equity, and of freedom, to be the guides and the masters of our lives."

THERE was a remarkable scene at the closing gathering of the great international convention of Christian Endeavor Societies in New York city. Ira D. Sankey, the sweet interpreter of gospel melodies, gave an address in which he referred to the pleasant relations of England and America, and said that war between the two nations was forever out of the question. The Canadian delegates sprang to their feet as Mr. Sankey sat down and electrified the audience by striking up "God Save the Queen." The convention broke into cheering, and all the women in the house waved their handkerchiefs. When the Canadians were through the audience promptly continued the song, substituting the words of "My Country, 'Tis of Thee." It was now Canada's turn to cheer and wave handkerchiefs. She replied to "America" with "Blest Be the Tie that Binds," the whole audience joined in and there was another scene of wild enthusiasm.

ONE of the more notable among the successful candidates in the British elections is the Right Hon. Dadabhai Naoroji, the newly-elected member for Central Finsbury. He is a native of Bombay. He went to London in 1855, and became a partner in the firm of Cane & Co. In 1874 he was appointed Dewan, or Prime Minister, of Baroda, and afterwards became a member of the Legislative Council of Bombay. At the last general election he was successful in contesting the Holborn Division of Finsbury as a Gladstonian. Lord Salisbury sneered at him as a "black man," and ridiculed the Gladstonians for putting up such a candidate. Mr. Naoroji is an expert on Indian affairs. In 1888 the Liberals gave him a banquet at the National Liberal Club as a protest against the language used by Lord Salisbury. With Hon. Edward Blake keeping it straight on the affairs of this continent and the ex-Dewan of Baroda looking after the interests of India the new Government will be in luck or the reverse, just as it bows to the line or fails in that respect.

THERE is considerable indignation in city postoffice circles because of the apparent favoritism shown to an ex-clerk named James Percival. Two years ago, evidence was accumulated by the local postoffice authorities strongly presumptive that Percival had tampered with registered letters, and had appropriated their contents to his own use. Percival disappeared before he could be brought to trial, and it is believed went to live in Detroit. Becoming tired of exile, he returned to the city on Tuesday, and surrendered himself to the police authorities. Incredible though it may appear, the Postoffice Department, though notified of the arrest, put in no appearance, and the accused was dismissed. This method of disposing of an accusation

so grave, surely is not countenanced by the Postmaster-General. If Percival is innocent, as ought to be presumed till he had a fair trial, failure to investigate the charge does him a distinct injury, while it does an obvious injustice to his former fellow clerks. Considering the great importance of maintaining honesty in service which the public has to continually trust, it is not surprising that the general comment on the disposal of this case is far from favorable.

### MR. GLADSTONE'S PERSONAL TRIUMPH.

Gladstone will worry along with the majority of 700 given him by the electors of Midlothian. Things have changed in Edinburgh since the days when for the Duke of Buccleuch, the territorial lord, to endorse the Conservative candidate for Midlothian, was to secure his election. Still, it is less than a dozen years since the Grand Old Man swept down on the constituency, and wrested it from the domination of Lord Dalkeith, the son and heir to The Buccleuch. That the Liberal chief still holds it by a majority so substantial, in spite of the most strenuous efforts on the part of his opponents to secure his defeat, is proof that the masses of Midlothian now think and vote for themselves.

### THE IMPORTANCE OF A FEW VOTES.

Sanford Fleming, the distinguished Canadian engineer, in a recent "Appeal to the Canadian Institute on the rectification of Parliament," points out the momentous results that may flow from the change of a few votes in a political contest. Taking the Provincial election in Quebec in March last as a case in point, it is found that the parties stand as follows:

Conservative members.....54  
Independents.....17

An examination of all the majorities shows that it would have been possible for 804 electors distributed over twenty constituencies, by reversing their votes, to have made the returns as follows:

Liberals.....37  
Conservatives.....34  
Independents.....2

If in 32 constituencies 200 Conservative electors had changed their votes, the returns would have stood as follows:

Liberals.....49  
Conservatives.....22  
Independents.....2

On such slight contingencies, says Mr. Fleming, as the change of a few votes under this system the government of a province has been completely revolutionized. Mr. Fleming's illustrations afford food for much thought. They confirm the view that honest people have always entertained regarding the unfairness of the partisan compilation of the Dominion voters' lists. A few men in close constituencies are virtually placed in a position to make and unmake parliaments.

### GREAT BRITAIN'S PROGRESS.

Those Canadians who have been lamenting the alleged decadence of Great Britain, because the motherland refuses to return to the system of high taxation on imports which brought misery and starvation to her workers half a century ago, should read the speech which Sir John Lubbock delivered in reply to Sir Charles Tupper's "protectionist" proposal at the Associated Chambers of Commerce. Sir John was president of the conference, and he twitted Sir Charles with ignorance of the progress which the Empire had made in commerce. British shipping had increased not only absolutely but relatively. As regarded trade, British commerce had increased \$500,000,000 in five years. There seemed to be an impression that protection was making progress. That was not so. If they took the free trading part of the Empire the commerce amounted to \$5,000,000,000, and the increase in twenty years had been \$1,500,000,000. In the protectionist part of the Empire the commerce was \$885,000,000, and the increase in the same time had been only \$375,000,000. Another indication of the prosperity of Great Britain in his Midlothian campaign. He pointed out that in the last twelve years no less a sum than \$1,595,000,000 had been expended by the taxpayers for the redemption of the national debt, which shows a steady reduction year by year. No nation outside of the United States, with its enormous natural resources and free trade over 60,000,000 and 70,000,000 of people, has made such material progress. The States have made wonderful strides, but not more marked, all things considered, than the enterprising industrial population found within the narrow confines of Great Britain.

### THE CONFLICT IN IDAHO.

WALLACE, Idaho, July 12.—Union miners from this place started for Wardner on a flat car. They sent word to the Bunker Hill & Sullivan Company that unless the "scabs" would surrender before 9 o'clock this morning the mine would be blown up. Large bodies of armed miners went to Wardner proper and toward the mine to await developments. Before 9 o'clock this morning all the Bunker Hill and Sullivan forces walked out of the mine and surrendered. The Sierra Nevada forces also surrendered. Not a shot was fired. What will be done with the non-union men is not yet known.
