Return of Exhibits from Chicago.
Canadian exhibitors at the World's Columbian Exposition are naturally anxious for the early return of their goods. Since the closing of the fair on Oct. 31, the Canadian staff has been at work preparing the goods for return. That process required waiting fer the return of the empty cases, which had been stored by the Exposition Company in a special warchouse, the packing of the goods under the supervision of the customs inspectors, and finally obtaining cars and loading the goods. This work, on account of the multitude of details, and the inadequacy of the customs service, has necessarily been slow. The enormous quantity of goods to be handled, and which it required several months to bring in, could not be got out in a week. Exhibitors must, therefore, exercise some patience. Up to Saturday last less than 100 cars of foreign exhibits have been shipped out of Jackson Park, and of this quantity Canada sent about one-fourth; so that the Canadian exhibits are being pushed forward at least as rapidly as those of any other country. It is hoped that all the Canadian goods will be shipped before Christmas. The efficial awards of the exposition will not be ready for delivery for some months yet, probably not until next June, when they will be given to the successful exhibitors without charge. 
