PROROGUED.

Close of the Fourth Session of the Seventh Dominion Parliament.

(Special to the ADVERTISER.)

OTTAWA, July 23.—When the House assembled today the Premier, Mr. Foster, Mr. Contag, Sir Adolphe Caron and half a dozen supporters represented the Conservatives. The Opposition was represented by one solitary member, Devlin, of Ottawa county.

Mr. Speaker went through the form of calling for petitions, motions and orders of the day.

The clerk at the table produced one petition praying that the Insolvency Bill may not become law. This superfluous prayer caused a smile of amusement to cross the face of the Premier, and some cried carried.

Messages from the Senate agreeing with the royal address of congratulation were received, and the Speaker left the chair until 3 o'clock, at which hour the House reassembled, and on receiving the summons of Black Rod proceeded to the Senate Chamber, where his Excellency was seated on the throne.

After assenting to all the bills passed during the session save one (respecting the Speaker of the Senate, which was reserved for the signature of her Majesty's pleasure) the Governor-General prorogued Parliament by delivering the following

SPEECH FROM THE THRONE.

Honorable Gentlemen of the Senate, Gentlemen of the House of Commons: In bringing to a conclusion this laborious session of Parliament I have to thank you for the assiduity and zeal with which you have attended the various matters which have been brought before you.

I congratulate you upon the notable fact that the invitation which my Government extended to the governments of the other colonies to send representatives to Canada to confer on matters affecting their mutual interests was so promptly accepted, and that her Majesty's Government also enhanced the dignity and usefulness of the conference by sending a representative to assist at its deliberations. It is confidently hoped that the results of the conference will be found beneficial to the colonies and to the empire generally.

The ratification of the treaty of commerce with France will lead, I hope, to a large increase in our exports and an extension of friendly relations with that country.

I trust that the arduous work which has engaged you in readjusting the duties of customs will accomplish the desired result of adapting the tariff to the present conditions of the various classes of our population.

The statistics of the session will show that laws affecting many public interests have been revised and greatly improved by your efforts, and I observe that you have likewise made generous provision for public improvements which are designed to increase the facilities for travel and transportation throughout the country.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons: I thank you for the liberal provision which you have made for the services of the current year.

Honorable Gentlemen of the Senate, Gentlemen of the House of Commons: In relieving you from your present duties, I pray that your labors may be fruitful of benefit to the country, and that on returning to your homes you will find that a generous harvest is about to reward the toil of our farmers, and that the blessing of Providence has been likewise bestowed abundantly on all the other interests of the people whom you represent.

WESTERN ONTARIO.

ERANT.

Annie Brown, a colored woman, of Brantford, attempted suicide on Saturday by taking Paris green. She was assigned as a reason that some people had been unkind to her. She will probably recover.

A dashing young man arrived in Brantford several weeks ago and cut a swain for a while. He is now in the cells. He gave his name as Harry Stinson, of Hamilton, but the police discovered that he was Harry W. Thorne, of Buffalo, and that his wife was in the cells of Buffalo on a charge of blackmail. The charge against Thorne is that of keeping a letter addressed to Harry Stinson, of Brantford, a young resident of that city.

ESSEX.

A man named Hilland, near Essex, was keeping company with a daughter of Wm. Potter, of Maidstone, against the wishes of her family. On Sunday he drove in the direction of the Potter house. When he was in front of the house Jessie was standing ready to go to church. The family were sitting in front of the door, and before they could recover from their surprise the young man jumped from the rig, lifted the young woman in, turned around, shook his wife was in the rig and drove away toward town. Potter and his son followed in another buggy. They caught up in front of the church, and the fight which took place there was a hot one. The old man and his son pulled the girl out of the rig and put her in their own. Hianc, who was assisted by his brother, pulled her out of that and placed her back again. When this performance was not going on the four men were pouring and claving at each other, while the girl screamed and the minister and the church people looked on, but evidently did not care to interfere. By the time John Kerr, a cousin of the young woman, got her in his rig her clothes were considerably damaged, and it was necessary for some of the ladies present to place their wraps around her. Mr. Kerr then drove her to his house and later on to her home.—[Maidstone Independent.]

ELGIN.

A great many of the older people of Delhi were very much surprised to see George Spencer in that place the other day. He left there some 30 years ago, the time of the American civil war, and had not been heard of since. It was generally supposed that he had been killed in the war.

Hon. G. W. Ross has under consideration bylaw 528 passed by the Elgin County Council at its June session, detaching Aylmer, the northern municipality, from the Aylmer High School district, and writes that if it was the intention to abolish the Aylmer district the bylaw will have to be referred to the Lieutenant-Governor in council for confirmation.

Jane, had left the house some time during Saturday night. The girl is in her 17th year, wore a blue dress, and took away a black valise and some other articles, but had no money. Sergeant Ross noticed a man and woman drive east along Talbot street in a covered buggy about 2 o'clock on Sunday morning.

It is stated as among the probabilities that Mr. John King, custom officer, will be superannuated, and that Mr. W. Nicol will be his successor. If this be carried into effect the "Birds" influence will be provided for. Mr. W. Ingram is postmaster, and Mr. J. W. Yearley is customs officer at Windsor. Mr. Nicol is alone left out in the cold.—[St. Thomas Journal.]

KENT.

A young man named Charles Buller, of Thamesville, was drowned at Pattersons grove, Ridgeway, Sunday. The young man, in company with Fred Lawrence, was bathing in the surf, and Buller was overpowered by a heavy wave and drowned before assistance could reach him. The body was recovered.

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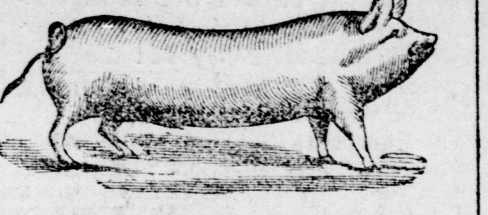
