There is very little hay marketed during the fair week, and hotelkeepers and others should lay in their supply at once. It is conceded by many that we have the largest crop of straw in many years. One large contract was made at \$4.50 per ton.

Butter and Eggs—No change in prices was noted in this line; crock butter sold at 15c to 15c, and pound rolls at 16c to 17c for large lots; a few small lots of gilt-edge butter sold at 18c for pound rolls. Eggs were steady, at 14c per dozen by the basket and crate.

Vegetables and Roots—A few loads of potatoes sold at 66c to 65c per bag; sales at these figures were easily made. Tomatoes were plentiful and lower in price, being about 10c per basket easier than on Saturday, selling at 30c for the 20-lb basket. Onions are a slow sale, at 50c to 60c per bu. No change in prices of other vegetables offered.

Fruits—There were several large consignments of peaches on sale, at the following figures: 20c to 30c for 8-quart baskets, and 30c to 40c for the 12-quart baskets of white peaches; the yellow peaches for the same sized baskets sold at 30c to 35c, and 40c to 60c, according to condition; Crawford peaches sold at 60c to 75c per basket. Montreal, Sept. 8.—There were about 1,200 head of butchers' cattle, 80 calves and 1,400 sheep and lambs offered for sale at the east end abattoir today. Action Postponed-Committee on Memorials at Work.

Winnipeg, Sept. 8.—A brief session of the Methodist conference was held on Saturday, when the report of the committee on memorials was discussed. The committee reported the election of Rev. E. B. Ryckman, D.D., as chair-man, and Dr. A. D. Watson as secre-tary. It recommended that the discipline be amended by the substitution for the words "layman," "laymen," and other masculine words wherever they occur the words "lay member," "member," "delegate," and "lay delegate." The effect of this would be to authorize the admission of women as members to district meetings, annual conferences and the general confer-

The point was raised that this was a constitutional question, which would require a two-thirds vote to carry the recommendation, and had been decided to be such by the general conference

Rev. Dr. Ross moved that this decision be reaffirmed. Mr. R. J. McLaughlin argued that the conference as a legislative body could not interpret the original constitution, that is the basis of union; and the first discipline, that of 1883: that this constitution declares certain matters to be constitutional, and that these can only be amended in certain

An amendment declaring that the question was not a constitutional one but was settled by a majority vote

A motion by Mr. N. W. Rowell, K. C., was finally carried that the conference deems it inexpedient to reverse its former decision and reaffirms such
