DON'T SHOOT THE OWLS

They Will Help to Keep the Mice From Your Fruit Trees.

Ottawa, Nov. 13.-The fruit division Ottawa, issues the following warning: "Last winter thousands of fruit trees were girdled and killed by mice, and the same thing will doubtless happen again the coming winter unless orchard-keepers take precautions to prevent it. Mice are not usually very troublesome in orchards where clear cultivation is practiced, and rubbish is not allowed to accumulate as a shelter for them, but the orchardist will find it necessary to find some sort of protection if he wishes to be fairly sure of bringing his young trees safely Waterloo, through the winter."

The fruit division also points out that the plague of mice is largely due to the common practice of destroying every owl and hawk that can possibly be shot or trapped. It is the greatest mistake to do this. All varieties of owls and hawks are great mousers; indeed mice constitute the chief item

in their bill of fare.
