London, June 2. - In the House of ords today, Lord Newton, Conservative, asked for further information concerning the recent mission to Af-ghanistan, headed by Louis Dane. secretary for foreign affairs of the Indian Government, and criticised the treaty, which, he said, placed Great Britain in a difficult position, because the Ameer at any time might bring on a crisis. Foreign Secretary Lans-downe said the mission had achieved the main object for which it had been dispatched. Great Britain had assumed the well defined liability to go to the Ameer's assistance in the event of an unprovoked attack upon Afghanistan, and the foreign relations f Afghanistan were under British guidance and control.


