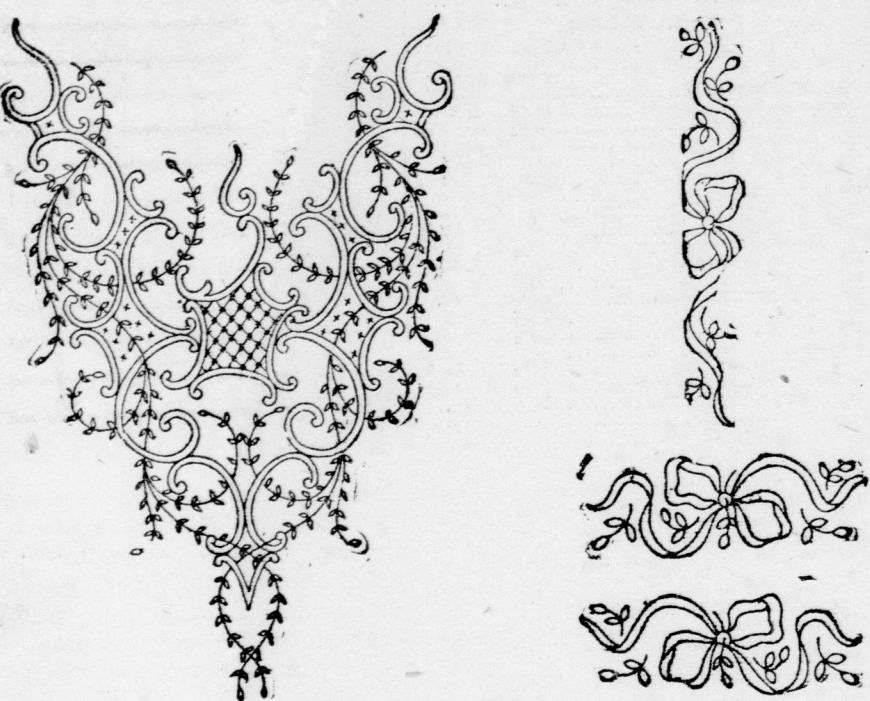

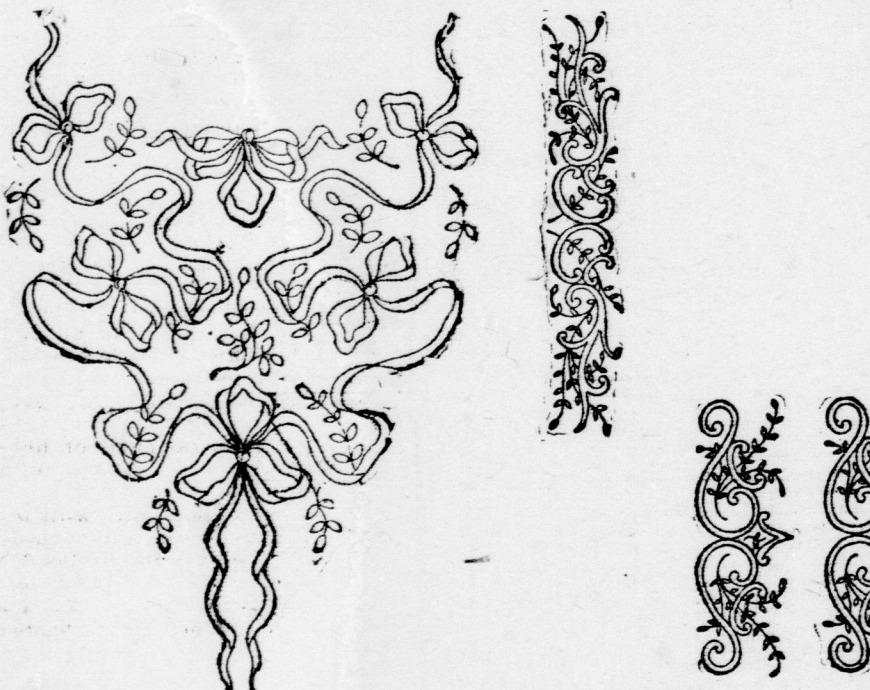

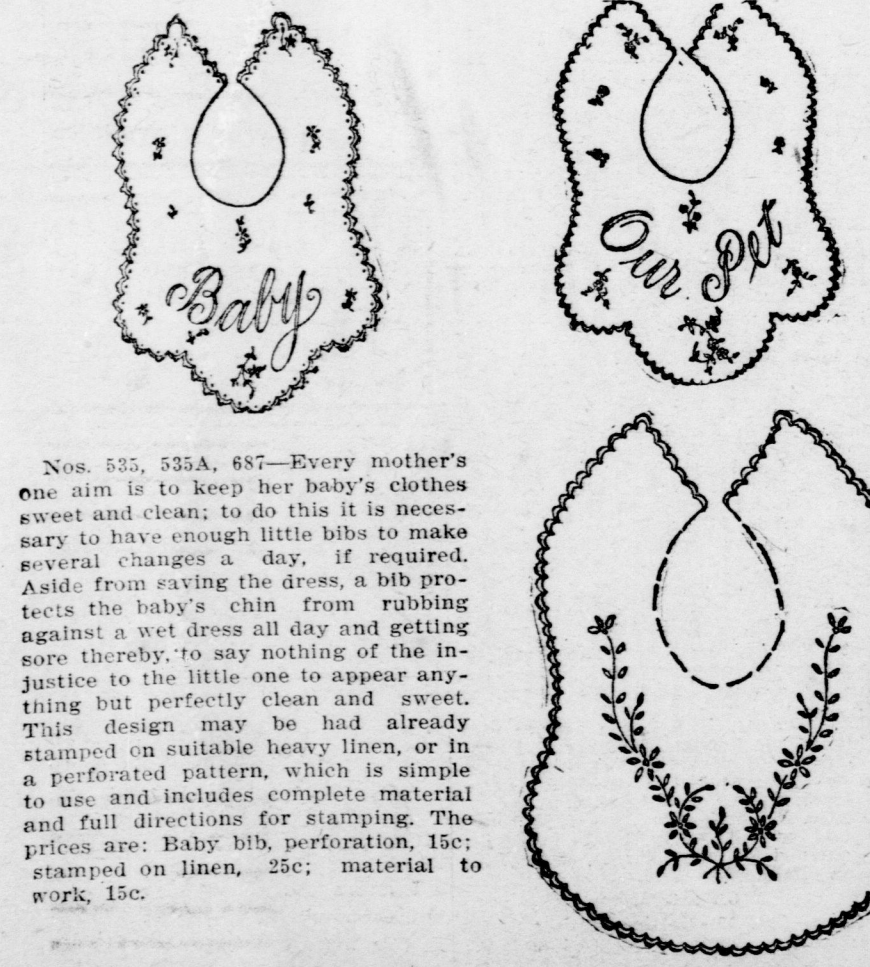

## THE ARCTIC ENDS A LONG CRUISE

The Expedition All But Made the "Northwest Passage"—Planted British Flag.

Ottawa, Oct. 18.—A dispatch from Father Point announces that the Dominion Government steamer Arctic passed that place at half-past eight this morning. Father Point is 160 miles below Quebec. The Arctic is homeward bound after a two-years' cruise in far northern waters. She sailed from Quebec, July 6, 1906, in command of the redoubtable Captain Bernier, whose life ambition it has been to discover the north pole.

Although the Arctic's cruise was not undertaken with that object, reports received from the commander last year indicated that she had done some remarkable Arctic navigation. It is said that in the summer of 1906 she proceeded up Baffin's Bay as far north as Smith's Sound, then turned south, and passing westward through Lancaster Sound, Barrow Strait and Melville Sound, touched Banks' Land, and wintered in Lancaster Sound. This, if true, is a notable achievement for one season, as it would mean that the expedition had all but made the "Northwest Passage."

During the summer of 1907 the Arctic has been cruising among the northern islands and coasts, planting the British flag at several headlands to indicate the sovereignty of the Dominion over those frozen regions.

## DUCLOS DECLARED SANE

Shot a Man Whom He Accused of Intimacy With His Wife.

Montreal, Oct. 18.—Alexander Duclos, whose trial for attempted murder some years ago, attracted much attention, as did the subsequent escapes of the prisoner from Longue Point Asylum, where he was incarcerated pending inquiry into his sanity, has been finally released from the asylum on an order from the attorney-general's office. Dr. Burgess, of the Protestant Asylum for the Insane, and Dr. Brodeur, of the Beauport Asylum, have reported that Duclos is sane. Duclos shot an insurance official named Desrochers, whom he accused of intimacy with his wife, but Desrochers recovered.

## TITANIC SEA-QUAKE

Disturbance Took Place in Bed of the Pacific Ocean.

Berkeley, Cal., Oct. 18.—Professor A. E. Leitch, of the University of California, announced yesterday that the center of the earthquake disturbance felt on the Pacific Coast Wednesday, and probably the same as registered on the seismograph at Washington, D. C., was about 1,000 miles south of Berkeley in mid-ocean, probably between the Hawaiian Islands and the south coast of Mexico. The shock is known to scientists as a sea quake, and is usually followed by a tidal wave. Reports of the shock were brought by incoming ships. According to the professor the intensity of the quake near its center far exceeded that of the California, Kingston, Valparaiso and Mexican earthquakes.

## HER LETTER DID IT

Anonymous Epistle Causes Arrest of Two on Stealing Charge.

Toronto, Oct. 18.—Herman Zanke and Michael Flanagan, who were accused of wholesale thefts of sugar from the Canadian Lake and Ocean Navigation Company, appeared before the police magistrate this morning, and were remanded for a week. The police claim they have Flanagan's confession that he and Zanke stole many bags of sugar from the company and sold them to restaurants and private houses. The discovery of the thefts came about in a very peculiar way. One of the employees of the company, the theft of something was wrong and told his wife. She was a woman of a religious turn of mind, and felt it would be a sin to conceal the information, so she sent an anonymous letter to the firm, which put detectives on the case, with the result that the arrests were made.

## TO MAKE CUTLERY AT SOO

Reported That German Company Will Produce Finished Article.

Sault Ste. Marie, Oct. 18.—It is rumored in the Canadian "Soo" that F. H. Clergue, at the head of a German company, has secured an option on the Ferro nickel smelter of the Lake Superior Corporation, now under course of construction, and, if the scheme goes through, will operate the smelter in producing white metal for the manufacture of cutlery. It is said that the company expects to produce finished cutlery in the "Soo." The metal is 80 per cent copper and 20 per cent nickel.

The first option on the smelter expired on Oct. 1 and was renewed until the 15th inst. It cannot yet be learned whether the option was again renewed, dating from that time, as Mr. Carnegie left yesterday for Germany.

## "MERELY A COLD" SAYS EMPEROR

Francis Joseph Sticks to Work Although Condition Worries Doctors.

Vicenna, Oct. 18.—The news received here from Schonbrunn Castle this morning regarding the health of Emperor Francis Joseph, was less satisfactory than it has been recently. His majesty passed a restless night, being frequently disturbed by bad attacks of dry coughing, which prevented him from obtaining much sleep. Therefore he rose earlier than usual, and when the doctors arrived they found that the catarrh symptoms were somewhat worse than during the previous days, that coughing was more frequent and more violent and that there was not enough expectation.

In addition, the patient, as a result of the bad night, was weaker, but the doctors hope that the emperor's satisfactory appetite will help him overcome the present signs of weakness. The general condition, however, requires the utmost attention. The attending physicians are worried by his majesty's unwillingness to restrict his work. He sits for several hours daily at his desk, thus aggravating his malady. He does not yet realize that he is ill, and says that "an old soldier must not notice a cold in the head."

## MINISTER PUGSLEY REPEATS CHARGES

Declares That Books of a Bank in Montreal Under Investigation Disclosed Facts.

St. John, N. B., Oct. 18.—The Liberals of the Joint Riding of Queen's-Sunbury, now represented in the Legislature of the Province of New Brunswick, today nominated Col. Hugh H. McLean, of St. John, solicitor for the C. P. R., as their candidate to contest the seat at the next Dominion election.

Hon. Wm. Pugsley, Minister of Public Works; Hon. C. W. Robinson, Premier of New Brunswick; Coté, McLean and others spoke, and Mr. Pugsley made some announcements of interest. Mr. Borden, he said, had been whining that he lost his election in Halifax through money. He (Mr. Pugsley) had stated in Fairville that if there was anything he hated it was hypocrisy, and lying was as bad, too. If a man had a weakness and did anything sinful it might be attributed to his heart, but if he lied or was guilty of hypocrisy it was through downright "cussedness." That was what Mr. Borden had been doing. It was time some one spoke out and showed that they were not in favor of the purity of one party alone. At the time of the last general election, in a little circle in Montreal alone, among the leaders and party managers of the day, there was gathered together no less than \$500,000 for the purpose of corrupting constituencies, and of that sum \$25,000 was employed in one county alone in New Brunswick. Mr. Kemp, speaking recently in Toronto, had asked why, he (Mr. Pugsley) was Attorney-General, he did not prosecute. Why, if they had prosecuted all the Tories, more would have been convicted than all the jails in the Province could hold. Mr. Foster had followed Mr. Kemp, and said that it was all bluff on his (Mr. Pugsley's) part. Mr. Foster spelt it out b-l-u-f, perhaps for Mr. Kemp's benefit, as he was a religious man, and was not acquainted with the game of poker. Mr. Foster apparently could claim some familiarity with it. He (Mr. Pugsley) had been told that in the game of poker it was not always necessary to put all the cards down on the table. He could tell them that this \$25,000 which was sent to New Brunswick came through a bank in Montreal, \$5,000 of it in October 24, 1904, and \$20,000 on October 27th. It was wired to the partner of the candidate in the Conservative interest. These facts were disclosed a few weeks ago in the course of certain legal proceedings. He would not put up any plea of privilege in this matter. It was a charge against all the managers of the Conservative party in Montreal and the Lower Provinces, and they would find it could be proved.

## SURVEYORS DROWNED

Three Employed by Grand Trunk Pacific Meet Tragic Death.

Vancouver, Oct. 18.—Three members of a Grand Trunk Pacific survey were drowned on October 4th in Giscome Rapids, thirty-five miles above Port George, on the Fraser River. They attempted to shoot the rapids in a canoe, but struck a rock, and the canoe broke to pieces. The drowned are William Lusby, Harry Cummings, W. Symington. The survivors are Robert Sheffield, J. Miller, Arthur Cape. No bodies were recovered. Canadian party from Edmonton brought the survivors to Quesnel.

all the evangelical churches; they must agree to close their churches and devote all their energies to the revival during his stay; they must agree to work in harmony and abstain from everything in the nature of sectarian diversions. Having received the joint invitation of the churches, he exacts material guarantees that the revival shall not be hampered by the constant whine of money begging for its support. Usually a stock company is formed, an incorporated "evangelical association," which issues shares in sufficient quantity to raise the necessary money. Sunday insists upon the erection of a wooden tabernacle, with fixed seats; a guarantee of the board and lodging of himself and his company, their traveling expenses, half the salary of Fred Fischer (who leads the singing), and the necessary printing and advertising.

"The evangelist specifically refuses to guarantee that the collections at the services will suffice to recompense the subscribers for the money they have advanced. But never yet has he failed to raise enough money within ten days or two weeks to square accounts. He takes none of this money for himself. On the last day of the meetings he makes a personal appeal on the ground that the laborer is worthy of his hire. He explains that this personal collection is for himself and his family and his helpers and is in lieu of the salaries and wages which they would earn in secular pursuits. He makes no stipulation as to the amount that is to be given.

"Give what you want to," he says. "Give as much as you think I have done the town good. I can get along if you don't give a cent, because lots of people have been more generous than I deserve. I think that the people who work for Christ ought to be enabled to live as well as those who work for the devil. But that's up to you."

**DOCTRINES OF DAMNATION.**  
Sunday preaches the doctrines of damnation. "In spite of his conviction that the truly religious man should take his religion joyfully, he gets his results," we are told, by inspiring fear and gloom in the hearts of sinners. His rebuke, like the commonplaceness of his vocabulary, would defeat its own purpose, says Mr. Denison, "were it not that the man's sincerity shines out from his face unimpeachably." We read further:

"Circus freaks and concert hall music, shirt sleeve oratory and melodramatic impersonation, the transfiguration of the Testament into harangues—these are not the means by which most of us have imagined that the sinners of the world were most effectively to be enlisted in the Christian army. Perhaps, though, it is worth remembering that a very long time ago there were those who deprecated the plain language of Paul. The Savior himself rebuked those who rejected the commandment of God that they might keep their own tradition. 'For God hath chosen the foolish things of the world to confound the wise; and God hath chosen the weak things of the world to confound the things which are mighty.' 'And the base things of the world, and things which are despised, hath God chosen.'"

## ROCKEFELLER ON THE STAND

Called By Federal Probers Into the Oil Combine.

New York, Oct. 18.—William G. Rockefeller, assistant treasurer of the Standard Oil Company, of New Jersey, was a witness today in the federal suit for the dissolution of the oil combine, and gave testimony regarding the large loans which appeared on the company's books as having been made to "Interests other than Standard." Mr. Rockefeller testified that these loans had been made to financial interests in this city. After being sworn as a witness, Mr. Rockefeller said he had been treasurer of the Standard Oil Company of New Jersey, Mr. Rockefeller said he knew nothing about the account of James McDonald, who, according to the Standard books had borrowed large sums of money from 1900 to 1904.

"Do you know James McDonald?" "I believe I have met him," said Mr. Rockefeller.

"Do you know anything about the Manhattan Oil Company, of Ohio?"

"Only what I have read in the newspapers," replied the witness.

## A ROYAL YATCHMAN.

Stockholm, Sweden, Oct. 18.—Prince Gustavus Adolphus, Duke of Soria, eldest son of the crown prince, Prince Gustavus, is manifesting great interest in the proposed challenge for the America's Cup in behalf of the Royal Swedish Yacht Club. The prince has declared his intention to support the movement by every means possible, and his name appears among those who have signed the appeal for subscriptions to the fund to carry the expenses of building a challenger and racing her in American waters.

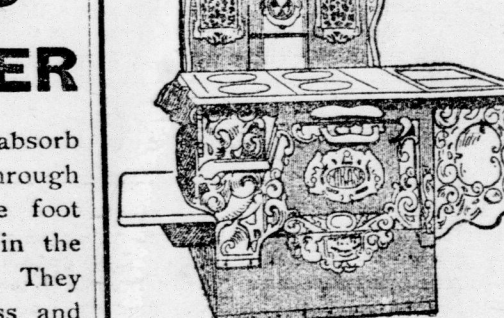
